

Sunday, April 28, 2024 **Bearing Fruit**



Today's readings: Acts 9:26–31; Psalm 22:26–27, 28, 30, 31–31: 1 John 3:18–24: John 15:1–8. "Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing," Jesus tells his followers in today's Gospel. Jesus is the vine of life. The father is the one caring for the vine. As branches, we are capable of bearing fruit. In the first readings, we hear of Paul, who had once persecuted Christians, seeking a place with the disciples. Paul changed his ways and became a participant in the vine of life.

When Paul turned from his former way of life, he "spoke out boldly in the name of Jesus." After Paul's conversion experience, he sought to keep the commandments and

remain in Jesus' love. Only by remaining in Jesus was Paul able to preach and bear fruit, for as the Gospel reading states, without Jesus, nothing can be done. How do you envision your connection to God the vine grower and to Jesus the vine? Is there anything in your life that you need God to prune so that you can bear more fruit? Ask Jesus to cut away that which impedes your growth in relationship to him. Reflect this week on what it means to remain in God. Do you consider that the good that you do is dependent on your relationship with God? When you stray from your connection with God, does the good that you do seem to falter?

ENCOURAGING THE SICK by Roberta Cheong

I was taking a walk along the inner perimeter of the physical



therapy gym in my nursing home one afternoon in August 2023. When I entered the gym, I saw a physical therapist (PT) working with a patient in a wheelchair, helping her to stand up on her own. As I walked past them, I heard the patient ask her PT, "Who's that?" I turned and said to her, "I'm just a patient (like you)." As I walked past them again, the patient said to me, "I wish I

can walk as well as you." I told her, "You'll get there soon." Discouraged and hopeless, she shook her head no, not thinking she could ever walk again. I wanted to share my testimony with her and give her encouragement, but I didn't want to take time away from her meager 15-minute therapy session. I remembered how every minute counted when I had my therapy sessions, because they were so brief. So I decided to wait until her therapy session was over. Meanwhile, I continued my walk while doing mental prayers. I prayed, "God, please speak through me to give her encouragement."

When her session was over, I asked her, "Can I share my story with you? Just a year ago, I couldn't even get into a wheelchair from the bed. So you're better off than where I was a year ago. I was bedridden, and that happened to me twice—once in 2019 and once in 2022. It was so painful to even just stand up that I couldn't stand for more than 10 seconds. People had to change me in my bed and I couldn't go anywhere. At least you are able to get into a wheelchair. Now I'm able to walk fine. And that was just a year ago. So just think of where you could be a year from now. And maybe you won't even need a year. Maybe in 6 months, you'll be back to normal. You'd be amazed at how quickly you could return to normal if you are determined to get better." She looked at me teary-eyed and said, "I wish you were my roommate." I asked her, "How long have you been at this nursing home?" She said 5 months. I asked her, "Well, in these 5 months, haven't you seen some progress and improvements in yourself?" Her PT then looked at her like, "Come on, you know you have." She admitted reluctantly, "Well, yeah."

Then she told me about the problems in her left hand. I said to her, "Oh! Well let me tell you about what happened to me in 2019. I lost all feeling in my toes, feet, legs, fingers, and hands. My parents had to come visit me every day at the hospital to feed me. I couldn't hold a fork, a spoon, or a cell phone, because it was too heavy. I couldn't dial the numbers on my phone. I couldn't even hold a cup of water up to my lips. I needed help for everything. And now I'm fine. So don't stop believing that you can be healed and that you can be back to normal. It's important to stay hopeful and believe that you can get better. He (referring to her PT) wouldn't be working with you if he didn't think there was any hope of you getting better." Her PT immediately said to her, "Yes! That's right! I wouldn't be working with you if I didn't think you could walk." I looked the patient in the eyes and said to her, "It's important to have determination and hope." They were both listening to me with total attention, and the patient was holding back tears the whole time.

Then she asked her PT, "Which room is that nice lady in?" It turns out our rooms were right across from each other! Then we introduced ourselves to each other. As she was leaving the physical therapy gym, she said to me, "I'm going to add you to my prayers, Roberta." I told Joyce that I was going to pray for her too. I said to her, "Look! You are traveling back to your room completely on your own. I was never able to do that when I was in a wheelchair!" Feeling encouraged now, she smiled and left. Then her PT said to me, "Thanks for your pep talk, and keep up with your walking!" He and I became friends that day.

I've discovered that one of the unique gifts born from my 10

years of kidney disease is that I am able to relate to the sick and the suffering, and they are able to relate to me. We seem to understand each other and instinctively know what the other

needs. With this gift, I am able to provide support and encouragement to them in a way where we are on an even level. They feel as though I am in the same boat as they are in, so they take my words of encouragement to them seriously. They don't say to me, "That's easy for you to say. You've never been in my shoes." Because I have been.

And maybe one of the reasons why God placed me in a nursing home with 200 sick patients is so that God may use me to speak some words of encouragement to them in order to uplift them and give them the hope they need on this journey to persevere in carrying their crosses. By being able to walk, I was literally showing Joyce hope as if to say, "There is hope for you too!" And because of this incident, I was able to live out these words of Scripture:

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and God of all encouragement, who encourages us in our every affliction, so that we may be able to encourage those who are in any affliction with the encouragement with which we ourselves are encouraged by God. For as Christ's sufferings overflow to us, so through Christ does our encouragement also overflow. If we are afflicted, it is for your encouragement and salvation; if we are encouraged, it is for your encouragement, which enables you to endure the same sufferings that we suffer. Our hope for you is firm, for we know that as you share in the sufferings, you also share in the encouragement" (2 Corinthians 1:3-7).

How can we use the encouragement we received from God to encourage those who need hope today?

THE ILL-FATED EAGLE By Fr. John Cuff

An eagle's egg was placed into the nest of a prairie chicken. It hatched and grew up among them. All its life, the misplaced eagle thought it was a prairie chicken and did only what prairie chickens did; it scratched the dirt for seeds and insects to eat, and flew no more than a few feet off the ground with a thrashing of wings like other prairie chickens. Years passed and the unsuspecting eaglet grew old. One day it saw a magnificent bird soaring gracefully above in the blue sky on its strong golden wings. "What a magnificent bird!" he exclaimed to its neighbor, "That's an eagle, the chief of birds," he replied, "but don't give it a second thought. You could never be like him." So the poor eagle never did, and it eventually died thinking it was a prairie chicken.

This frightening story underlies the importance of what we identify ourselves with. We humans are like vine branches; we need a vine in which to graft and root ourselves. That in turn conditions the way we see ourselves and the expectations we have for ourselves. Vines come in various forms, each soliciting our primary allegiance, whether in the form of nationalism such as Nazism, an ideology such as communism, or a religion such as a cult. Materialism, pleasure, and power are among the most popular vines of our times. Once we identify ourselves with a false vine, it immediately determines how we see ourselves and what we do with our lives.

The Jews whom Jesus is addressing in today's Gospel knew very well the vine on which they were supposed to be grafted and rooted. In the Old Testament, the religious and national entity Israel was referred to as the vine (Psalm 80:8; Isaiah 5:7; Hosea 10:1) which the hand of God had planted. The Maccabees even minted a coin on which a vine represented Israel. So when Jesus claimed that He was now the vine, the Jews understood that as an invitation to shift their primary allegiance from Jewish nationalism to the person and message of Christ. And to make sure they get it, He makes the claim that He's not just the vine but the true vine. The word "true" signifies that which is real, authentic and valid, as opposed to that which is flawed, imperfect or false. To accept Jesus as the true vine into which our lives are grafted and rooted is to regard every human institution recommending itself as an object of our primary allegiance as flawed, imperfect, or false. Thus, the misguided eagle in our story was like a branch grafted on a false or imperfect vine. That's why it remained false or imperfect all its life. If a wiser bird had told it the truth about itself, it would have shifted its selfidentification from prairie chicken to eagle. This radical shift in self-understanding would then have enabled it to enjoy and produce the marvelous feats for which eagles are known. Today the Gospel invites us to see ourselves in terms of our oneness with Christ, just as the vine and the branches are one. Only then we'll be able to bear good fruit, the same type of fruit that Christ Himself bears. So let us graft and root ourselves as vine branches on the True Vine. Jesus Christ.


