




Regulations for Lenten Sacrifice

- ★ All Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat for Catholics over 14.
- ★ Ash Wednesday (Feb. 17) and Good Friday (April 2) are days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. Fasting means taking only one full meal and two smaller meals that, taken together, do not equal one full meal.
- ★ Throughout Lent, Catholics are especially encouraged to perform voluntary acts of penance.

Illinois Seniors Can Get Vaccinated at the United Center until May

Please be aware of an opportunity for Illinois seniors age 65 and older to schedule COVID-19 vaccination appointments. At this time, the United Center registration is limited to people living in nine high vulnerability zip codes, of which 60608 is one. To reach the United Center Help Desk, call 312-746-4835. However, be prepared to call several times. From those I have spoken to, the best time to call is in the late afternoon. The hours for the Help Desk are as follows: Monday-Saturday: 8:00 am to 8:00 pm; Sunday: 8:00 am to 4:00 pm.

Drive-through and walk-up options are available. Language assistance is provided, and the United Center is accessible to people with disabilities.

Cardinal Cupich shared a message and resources from the Vatican's Dicastery for Human Development with the presbyterate regarding the COVID-19 vaccine. To highlight a few key headlines:

- o Catholics can receive whatever vaccine is offered to them – Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson – with a clear conscience.

DEATH TO NEW LIFE

When I was teaching first grade, we would often study about how seeds would grow. Sometimes we would put the seeds in dirt and water them. It was much easier to use beans, put water in a glass jar, and place cotton at the top. We would make sure that the cotton extended into the water and the beans were toward the top of the cotton. Gradually the beans would sprout roots and then continue to grow. Because they were in a glass container, it was easy to see how they could grow the roots and watch how the plant would grow. It would grow quickly. The children could see the change and growth.

Part of today's Gospel reminds us about the grain of wheat. "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat. If it dies, it produces much fruit." Jesus calls us, through these stories, to follow Him, to serve Him. In doing so, we often have to choose to give up portions of how we want to live, or give up parts of our lives.

By serving and following Jesus, we will be wherever Jesus is. The Father will not only honor Jesus but will also honor us. We are in the fifth week of Lent. Soon we will be celebrating the Feasts of Holy Week. What are you willing to do to follow Jesus and serve Him this week, preparing for Holy Week and Easter? Every day, as we begin the morning, we can reflect on what our day will be filled with. What sacrifices will we be called to make? What virtues will you have to practice to follow Jesus? How will you make the sacrifices which would help you to grow like the seeds? Growing seeds are never the same. Followers of Jesus will serve the Father as Jesus did. Walk in Jesus' steps. Prepare for Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter. Prepare not only for the death and suffering of Good Friday but the New Risen Life of Easter.

PRAAYER TO ST. JOSEPH AFTER THE ROSARY | USCCB

This prayer to Saint Joseph—spouse of the Virgin Mary, foster father of Jesus, and patron saint of the universal Church—was composed by Pope Leo XIII in his 1889 encyclical, *Quamquam pluries*. He asked that it be added to the end of the Rosary, especially during the month of October, which is dedicated to the Rosary. It may be said after the customary *Salve Regina* and concluding prayer, and may also be used to conclude other Marian devotions.

During the Year of Saint Joseph

The prayer is ordinarily enriched with a partial indulgence (*Handbook of Indulgences*, conc. 19). During the Year of Saint Joseph, however—which lasts from December 8, 2020 to December 8, 2021—the use of this prayer has been included among those enriched with a plenary indulgence (see [Decree](#) of the Apostolic Penitentiary issued Dec. 8, 2020, section E). It may be said on any day of the Year of Saint Joseph, but especially on his various feast days or other devotional days dedicated to St. Joseph:

- ★ December 27, 2020, the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph
- ★ March 19, 2021, the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary
- ★ May 1, 2021, the Optional Memorial of Saint Joseph the Worker
- ★ the nineteenth day of each month
- ★ every Wednesday, the traditional day of the week for devotions to Saint Joseph
- ★ "St. Joseph Sunday" and suitable days of other liturgical rites in the Eastern Catholic Churches

Prayer to Saint Joseph

To you, O blessed Joseph,
do we come in our tribulation,
and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse,
we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you
to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God
and through the paternal love
with which you embraced the Child Jesus,
we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance
which Jesus Christ has purchased by his Blood,
and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family,
defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ;
O most loving father, ward off from us
every contagion of error and corrupting influence;
O our most mighty protector, be kind to us
and from heaven assist us in our struggle
with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril,
so now protect God's Holy Church
from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity;
shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection,
so that, supported by your example and your aid,
we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness,
and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven.

SUNDAR'S JOURNEY

There's a true story about a Christian hunter named Sundar, who lived in the Himalayan Mountains. During a very cold winter he was traveling by foot with a Buddhist monk. Their destination was a monastery high in the mountains. Suddenly the weather changed. The temperature dropped, snow began to fall, and the journey became dangerous. Night was coming and the weather was turning even worse. As they trudged through the snow, there was a very good chance that they would freeze to death.

They crossed over a narrow path above a steep cliff when they heard someone calling out for help. Below them, another traveler had fallen, and lay deep down in a ravine. He'd broken his leg. The monk warned Sundar, "Don't stop. God has brought this man to his fate. It is his karma. He must work it out for himself. That is our tradition. We must hurry on ourselves before we die." Sundar responded, "But I am a Christian: it is my tradition that God has led me here to help my brother. I cannot abandon him."

So Sundar went down into the ravine. Meanwhile the monk hurried on alone. When Sundar came upon the injured man he found that the man had broken his leg. So Sundar made a rough sling and hauled the man onto his back. He struggled greatly, but he was able to carry the man up to the path. Sundar felt his body overheating, but he continued to carry the man on his back. They were warmed by each other's body. Sweating hard, and almost fainting, Sundar finally caught sight of the monastery. Then a few hundred yards away from the monastery, Sundar stumbled and fell. He had fallen over the dead body of the monk who had left him. The monk had frozen to death with the monastery within sight. As Sundar brushed the snow away from the monk's body, he remembered Jesus' words in the Gospel: "The one who would save his life, will lose it. The one who would lose his life for my sake will find it." Sundar had been saved by doing what Jesus did: Giving his life so that others might live.

In today's Gospel Jesus likens himself to a grain of wheat that falls to the ground and dies to produce much fruit. In this he shows us the example we are to follow. Following him means not simply dying but dying and rising. If we do not die to our selfish ways, especially when a neighbor is in need, we will not grow. Self-sacrifice is a necessary part of our journey and fundamental to our Christian tradition, as Sundar realized. We cannot avoid the paschal mystery, and there is no shortcut.

An Interview with Jing Zhang (February 2021):

Jing describes herself before her baptism as someone who was searching for a purpose in life. Once she encountered God everything clicked into place for her. She now feels that God is calling her to share His love and the beauty of the faith with others. When the Renew My Church summit first took place, Jing knew she wanted to play an active role of evangelization in her parish. When asked what personally inspired Jing to take on these renewal efforts in her parish, Jing stated that she keeps going by contemplating the meaning of Jesus' sacrifice and of His great love. Saints like Mother Teresa also inspire Jing by helping remind her that small acts of kindness can go a long way for people. Throughout her time in the parish and along her journey as an Evangelization Co-Lead, Jing has relied more on God to help see her through some unique challenges. She knows that she is not alone in her struggles and that working towards building the Kingdom of God takes time and great love. For new Leads starting out in the field, Jing hopes that they can see themselves reflected in their brothers and sisters. "[We must] trust that God is working through us... that we have all of His compassion and love. Our faith is a beautiful gift...we must share the good news and God will take care of the rest," Jing states.


