


- ★ Good Friday (April 2) is a day of fasting and abstinence for Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. Fasting means taking only one full meal and two smaller meals that, taken together, do not equal one full meal.
- ★ Throughout Lent, Catholics are especially encouraged to perform voluntary acts of penance.

Illinois Seniors Can Get Vaccinated at the United Center until May

Please be aware of an opportunity for Illinois seniors age 65 and older to schedule COVID-19 vaccination appointments. At this time, the United Center registration is limited to people living in nine high vulnerability zip codes, of which 60608 is one. To reach the United Center Help Desk, call 312-746-4835. However, be prepared to call several times. From those I have spoken to, the best time to call is in the late afternoon. The hours for the Help Desk are as follows: Monday-Saturday: 8:00 am to 8:00 pm; Sunday: 8:00 am to 4:00 pm.

Drive-through and walk-up options are available. Language assistance is provided, and the United Center is accessible to people with disabilities.

Cardinal Cupich shared a message and resources from the Vatican's Dicastery for Human Development with the presbyterate regarding the COVID-19 vaccine. To highlight a few key headlines:

- o Catholics can receive whatever vaccine is offered to them – Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson – with a clear conscience.

- o We should not fail to advocate for universal accessibility of vaccines as an important ethical issue.

NEW LIFE **By Sister Caritas**

Young children are people of wonder, awe and excitement. When they start to see Christmas decorations and Santa Claus in windows and stores, young children are very excited. Mothers and Fathers get the questions. "How long before Christmas?" The next day they get up and ask, "Is it Christmas yet? Is Christmas tomorrow?" And so the questions go. Sometimes it is that way with a young child's birthday, or a visit to Grandmother's house. When we would ride to my Mother's hometown to visit my grandparents and family, we would ride by car beyond Milwaukee. It would take two or more hours. We would be quiet. Then we would say, "Mommy are we almost there?" She would say "Six more hills." That would keep us quiet for a while and then we would ask again.

After the weeks of Lent, we are finally only a week away. Today is Palm Sunday. Thursday is Holy Thursday, Friday is Good Friday and the following Sunday is Easter. Holy Saturday our candidates and catechumens will be Baptized, receive the Holy Eucharist and be Confirmed. These special days make this the holiest week of the year. What does this week mean to you? Will you take each day and live it to the fullest? Will you take time to read the stories of the day, the scripture of the days? Will you come to Mass on Holy Thursday? Will you come to Services and stations on Good Friday? Will you celebrate with our candidates and catechumens the "new life" they will receive?

Sunday we remember and relive the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem to the praise of the crowd, the waving of palms. Listen deeply to the story of the Gospel, telling us the stories of the whole week. Do not say, "I've heard this story before." Listen with new ears, an open heart. Embrace the words with freshness and deep faith. It is the story of our salvation and the touchstone of preparation for Easter, Fullness of New Life. It's up to YOU.



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

“CRUCIFY HIM”

In today's Passion story from St. Mark, we hear the shouting of the crowd loud and clear, “crucify Him.” The crowd was given the opportunity to release one of the prisoners, but they wanted Jesus to be crucified. Why did they want so badly to have Jesus crucified? After all, Jesus came to save them too. Didn't they like Jesus? Were they simply doing that to please Pilate? Or were they simply acting out of their blindness and sinfulness?

They chose to put Jesus on the cross, but they were powerless to keep Jesus there. Three days after His crucifixion, He was raised to new life. His Resurrection shows God's power over sin, darkness, violence and death. Through His Resurrection and Ascension, we, His disciples, are promised of eternal life if we love one another as He loves us. This indeed is the good news.

Unfortunately, Jesus' Resurrection didn't wipe out all bad people or sin from the face of the earth. Our freedom to choose makes us vulnerable to offend our God and one another. Whatever we do to the least of our brothers and sisters, we do it unto Jesus (Mt. 25: 40). When we do good for others, we do it for Jesus. When we do evil towards others, we do it to our Lord too.

Jesus continues to suffer today because of our irresponsible choices. When people take advantage of the poor, ignoring the needy, and insulting strangers, when people carry out violence, hate crimes, and killing innocent lives, we continue to act like the crowd of Jesus' time and our words and actions continue to crucify our Lord.

We also have so many social ills in our world now. The recent hate crimes committed against our Asian sisters and brothers is a concrete example. When people act out of hatred and violence simply because of our differences in colors, cultures, or educations, we are not living out Jesus' command for us to love our God with all we have and all we are, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Our violent actions and behaviors are indeed making us like the crowd of Jesus' time as the ones who carry out the horrible act of crucifying Him.

Our Church too acts at times like the crowd of Jesus' day who continues to sacrifice Jesus out of ignorance and sinfulness. When innocent children are being abused, when Christians are acting disrespectful of others, when God's creatures are mistreated irresponsibly, we are shouting “crucify him.”

Jesus suffered for our sins. Today our suffering has meaning because we unite ourselves with the Lord. More than finding meaning in our suffering, today we must stop creating pains for others and we must listen to Jesus's commandment of love and practice it in our lives by protecting every poor, needy, dying person, every stranger, every prisoner, and every infirm person.

May the passion of the Lord help us to be compassionate!

STATEMENT OF CARDINAL CUPICH ON THE ATLANTA-AREA SHOOTINGS

To our brothers and sisters in the Asian-American community, please know the Archdiocese of Chicago and the whole church stand with you in this moment of grief and horror. We pray for the victims of the Atlanta shootings and their loved ones.

A recent study found that from 2019 to 2020 anti-Asian hate crimes increased 150% — even while hate crimes, in general, dropped 7% over the same period. This is intolerable. We pray for all who suffer racist violence and hate speech. There can be no place for either in our society, and it is incumbent on all of us to resist language, culture, and acts that denigrate Asian Americans and all people of color — because they have deadly consequences. We must be ever vigilant against words that inspire acts of hate — this responsibility is even greater for elected officials.

When people make racist comments or jokes, it normalizes bigotry, reinforces racism and risks encouraging those who would commit hate crimes. It is incumbent on all Christians, all Americans, to resist subtle and overt acts of bigotry, to build up the common good through acts of love for all our neighbors, near and far.

HE DIED FOR US

All Christians would agree that the most important symbol of Holy Week is the cross. Whereas Protestants usually omit the figure of Jesus and have a bare cross, Catholics usually have a Crucifix, showing Jesus hanging on the cross. We believe Christ is nailed to the cross to show how much He loves us; He is not dying on the cross for what He has done, but for what you and I have done, because He loves us. "He died for us," we say.

"He died for us." Most of us have become so used to hearing these words that we no longer appreciate their meaning: "He died." An innocent man gave up His life. "For us." And He did so to rescue us sinners from death. We've heard this phrase so many times that it now carries with it neither the shock of someone dying on account of what we have done nor the good news of our being delivered from death. That's why the Church displays crucifixes rather than empty crosses—to remind us of the extent of Christ's great love for mankind, so much so that He was willing to die in our place. To grasp this message, the story of a man who literally died for the misdeeds of his brother might help:

Two brothers lived together in the same apartment. The elder brother was an honest, hard-working and God-fearing man, while his kid brother was a dishonest, gun-toting, substance-abusing rogue. Often the younger man would come back into the apartment late, drunk, and with a lot of cash, and the elder brother would spend hours pleading with him to mend his ways and live a decent life. But the young man would have none of it. So one night the younger brother ran into the house with a smoking gun and blood-stained clothes. "I just killed a man," he announced. In a few minutes the house was surrounded by police and the two brothers knew there was no escape. "I didn't mean to kill him," cried the younger brother; "I don't want to die!" But by now the police were banging at the door. The older brother had an idea; he quickly exchanged clothes with the blood-stained clothes of his killer brother. The police arrested him, tried him, and condemned him to death for murder. He was executed and his younger brother lived. He died for his brother.

Can we see that this story of crime and death is basically a story of love? Similarly the story of the suffering and death of Jesus which we heard in the Passion is basically a story of love – Christ's love for us. How should we respond to it? Well, how would you expect the younger brother to respond to the death of his older brother? Naturally we'd expect him to respond with GRATITUDE. Gratitude to his generous brother should make that young boy turn a new leaf and never return to a life of crime. He would be a most ungrateful wretch if he should continue living the sort of life that made his brother die.

Moreover, gratitude should make him keep the memory of his brother alive. Not a day should pass that he should not remember his brother who died for him. And, finally, if the dead brother had a wife and children, then we should expect the saved brother, out of gratitude, to love and care for them. What God expects from us today is gratitude --- gratitude strong enough to make us hate sin of every kind, and strong enough to make us translate our love of Christ into love for all his brothers and sisters. Are we that boy?

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
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
