

Covid-19 Changes

Please be reminded that, beginning on Pentecost Sunday, we resumed the **Ushering, Altar Serving, and Gift Bearing Ministries**. Collection now takes place by our ushers and parishioners are invited to bring up the gifts at each mass.

The following guidelines are still in place:

1. A mask, covering your nose and mouth, must be worn at all times during mass.
2. Congregational loud singing is discouraged. All service music continues to be recited.
3. We continue to practice Social Distancing in Church.

Collection Information

Basket: We have recently returned to having the ushers collect at Mass and have determined that having two collections each week is no longer "the best practice".

Going forward, there will only be one collection at Mass. Your offering envelope and any 2nd collection envelope will be collected at the same time. Second collections will only take place for the Archdiocese-required collections such as Peter's Pence, Retired Religious, Latin America, etc.

Check: Please make all checks payable to St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta Parish. This includes weekly collections, mass stipends, candle money, etc.

HAVING FULLER LIFE IN CHRIST

Good things happen to us when we pray. Prayer is the fundamental connector between us, our God and others. When we take time to talk to God and to listen to God, we are not self-centered and we allow God to take lead in our thoughts, feelings, and actions.

How blessed we are as a faith community to have the Sisters of the Missionary of Charity to pray for us in our streets, neighborhood and Churches. On Mondays at 4pm, Sisters and parishioners walk around to pray the rosary for your intentions and for the needs of our community. All are welcome to join us.

As the easing of the pandemic restrictions continues, we are grateful to welcome back in person many of our sisters and brothers for the communal celebration of the Eucharist. It's wonderful to have our Altar Servers and Ushers back in service. As of this past Friday, our State and City reopened fully; we expect the Archdiocese to follow the lead very soon. This means that we as a parish will have to adjust safely to the next phase of our life.

Looking forward, I am praying and hoping to resume and reignite many of our parish activities that were disrupted by the pandemic. Some of you have already started to prepare for the Chinatown Summer Fair (July 31 and Aug. 1); others are looking forward to the celebration of the feast of our parish's patroness, St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta, on Sept. 5th at 9:30 a.m. at the St. Barbara Worship site. Bishop Robert Lombardo, CFR, will be our celebrant. Please mark your calendars. And still others wonder: What about evangelization? What about Alpha? What about "the building of the new reality"?

In preparation for reigniting our parish life more fully, I have asked Tom Howard, DRE, to provide our faith community with a better idea of what the *Building the New Reality* (BNR) phase entails for us here at SMTCP this summer. BNR represents a call for each newly configured parish in the Archdiocese of Chicago to make disciples, build community and inspire witnesses. But what is our plan? We are still working on it. Nevertheless, Tom will help initiate the process by clarifying, in practical terms, the language and vocabulary included in BNR.

More and more parish members now receive COVID vaccinations. Thanks to this fact, we can start to address many unmet parish needs. Evangelization stands out at the top of this list. Efforts like Alpha, youth, and young adult ministries, family and senior ministries also will be addressed in this summer series. Finally, the Chinese Apostolate will be explored in this series.

I hope you can take the time to check out this space in the coming weeks. With your prayers, help and cooperation, together, we can *build a new reality* here in our community,

LIFE FROM DEATH

Christ's parables often speak of seeds to illustrate the growth of the Kingdom of God. In nature, for example, we find how a small acorn can produce a mighty oak tree or how a single watermelon seed planted in the ground can produce up to 200,000 times its own weight in rich nutritious fruit. Christ highlights the tiny mustard seed which grows into a great tree to describe the dynamic growth of the Kingdom of God.

Seeds are fascinating. Years ago there was a news report in *Time Magazine* about archeologists who discovered an ancient Egyptian tomb, 5000 years old. Besides the artifacts they discovered in the tomb were some shriveled and hard crusty seeds that looked withered and dead. Then someone planted the seeds in good rich soil, watered them, added fertilizer and, amazingly, they grew into rich, beautiful plants. Those seeds had lain dormant for 5000 years, unable to bring forth life, until someone planted them in the ground and they brought forth abundant life.

A similar phenomenon occurs in nature. In late winter, with the weather cold and damp, caterpillars wrap themselves up in dark, musty cocoons, apparently dead. But with the coming of spring, the cocoon is ripped open and a beautiful, colorful butterfly emerges—another symbol of life coming from death.

No wonder Christ says that a grain of wheat, like an acorn or a watermelon seed buried in the ground, is a fitting example of the paradox of life through death, which abounds in nature. Christ likens himself to a grain of wheat that chooses to die, but in dying brings forth the abundant fruit of eternal life.

As Spring returns, nature is full of examples of what Jesus says in the Gospels: "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain; but if it dies it bears much fruit." He says something similar can happen with us. Although we've been living in the darkness of winter, in the bonds of sin, yet if we're willing to die to sin with Christ, we can be brought back to life again, life far more glorious than before. So this Spring let us open ourselves up, our hard crusty shells to God, like a buried seed in dying opens itself up and becomes a beautiful fruit or vegetable, flower or tree. Or let us break open our hard, crusty cocoon to become a living, thriving butterfly. This is the challenge of Spring, to willingly die and rise with Jesus in our lives, so that we be part of the imperceptible but steady growth of God's Kingdom.

SMALL SEEDS

Since my brother came home from the hospital and nursing home a few years ago, he has not been able to pull weeds and do the gardening around his house. I spent Memorial Day with him and his family. My sister-in-law, my niece and I pulled weeds, my brother doing what he could. From a small space in front of his home, we filled about twelve bags of weeds. The whole side of his house and a little more in front of his house need more weeding and gardening. Some of the most difficult weeds are the dandelions with their deep roots. They spread from a small seed, carried by the wind from one plant to other soil to plant itself and begin to grow.

In the Gospel today, Jesus uses parables to teach about the Kingdom of God. The parable of the mustard seed, one of the smallest seeds which grows into a large bush, is an example of the kingdom. Jesus started out with twelve apostles and some other followers. Through the many centuries since Jesus, thousands of people have taken that small seed of the Word of God and believed it, taught it, spread it, and lived it. Nazareth was no world-famous city. The apostles were fishermen. Learning from Jesus how to share the Word of God was the only "degree" they had. The seed of the Word of God gives life and grows.

Faith in the Word of God gives us the strength to reach out, to respond to the call and urging of the Spirit. The small seed planted in us in baptism makes us able to minister to others. We may be a small group of believers but, with the power of our faith, we can share the Word of God, the faith we have in us and the love that bonds us. These things are like the small seed that gives us strength to grow in faith and God's life, and to spread the Word to those around us. Our ministry can grow by the work of the Holy Spirit in us and in the community, the Church. What begins very small grows to many, many more believers who carry the Word to all they meet. We encourage others to "walk by faith and not by sight". We "Love one another". Early Christians were known for their love of one another. That's how they knew the community was "Christian". We have been given the Word of God. As the Second Reading tells us, "we walk by faith, not by sight". We carry the small seed of the Word to the whole world.

Baptisms: Parents must be registered practicing parishioners and attend a baptismal preparation session before a baptism will be scheduled. Call the rectory office for further information.

Communion Calls: Please contact the Rectory when someone who is homebound or in the hospital wishes a visit to receive Holy Communion or the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The Anointing of the Sick is for anyone seriously sick and not only for those near death.

Ministry of Care: Eucharistic Ministers are available to visit, pray with, and bring Holy Communion to those who are sick and unable to attend Mass. Notify the Parish Office when this service is needed.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a program for anyone inquiring and seeking information about entering the Catholic faith.

Weddings: Weddings need to be scheduled at least six months in advance. Couples are reminded to secure the Church date before the reception hall.


