

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

## TODAY I AM GRATEFUL FOR...

**"Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4: 6-7).**

"Will our church be open for the coming weekend?" I was asked this question a few times in the last several days. With the increase of the COVID positivity rate in our city, state, and community, and with the "stay-at-home advisory" from our mayor, it is understandable that people are very anxious and overwhelmed with much frustration and other emotions.

"The virus is real. I personally know 3 people died from it and 2 people are suffering from it now," somebody shared this troubling reality. One thing for sure is that when this deadly virus hits home, our natural reactions are stronger and our emotions are higher. We might be angry, upset, sorrowful, or fearful. Continuously facing the destruction and danger of this global pandemic, what have we learned as a human family from it; in what way have I been changed by it? Am I still grateful and what am I grateful for today and on this memorable Thanksgiving Day?

### SHEPHERD KING By Sister Caritas

When we look at kings in our world or in the recent past, many of them were individuals seeking power or land or dominance or all three of these qualities. Some kings have been concerned for the people they ruled. Today we celebrate the Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

Unlike the previous royal history, we are given today in the readings a description and a model of how Jesus acts, lives, would rule, as King of the universe. The image given us in the first reading is that of God tending His sheep, caring for His lost people. Rescuing them when they are in danger and caring for them. That truly is the role of the shepherd, feeding his flock, leading them, keeping them from danger and knowing them one by one. The psalm is the story of the Lord as our shepherd. The shepherd cares so much for his flock that he will lay down his life for his sheep, seeking those that are lost. Jesus laid down His life for us.

We are called to be members of the flock. The Gospel describes the basis upon which our membership will be judged. "Did you feed the hungry? Did you clothe the naked? Did you shelter the homeless? Did you instruct the ignorant? Did you seek the lost?" In your life was there always room for one more? If that is your life, then you are walking in the footprints of Jesus. The Father will tell you "when you did it to the least brothers or sisters of mine you did it to me. You will enter the kingdom. Jesus will defeat His enemies, including death. Like the shepherd He will bring everything under God's rule."

## THE SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING By Fr. John Cuff

The Solemnity of Christ the King, which every Catholic throughout the entire world is celebrating today, is a new thing. It was established by Pope Pius XI in 1925 in an encyclical letter called *Quas Primas*.

The pope was writing this encyclical in 1925, when the world was still trying to recover from World War I, which had devastated Europe and shattered modernity's hopes for unlimited progress based solely on human reason.

1925 was also only a few years after the Russian Bolshevik Revolution, which had given birth to the world's first explicitly atheist totalitarian regime: Soviet communism. Everywhere the pope looked, he saw human societies abandoning Christian values and trying to build paradise on earth through other means.

But if humanity had been able to perfect itself by itself, without God's help, then Jesus Christ would never have come to earth.

Pope Pius XI instituted today's Solemnity as a way to remind the world that to reject Christ, either in private life or in public life, is to reject our only hope, and to accept him is to accept salvation.

As Pope Pius IX wrote: "...When once men recognize, both in private and in public life, that Christ is King, society will at last receive the great blessings of real liberty, well-ordered discipline, peace and harmony... That these blessings may be abundant and lasting in Christian society, it is necessary that the kingship of our Saviour should be as widely as possible recognized and understood, and to that end nothing would serve better than the institution of a special feast in honour of the Kingship of Christ." (*Quas Primas*, 19, 21)

**Baptisms:** Parents must be registered practicing parishioners and attend a baptismal preparation session before a baptism will be scheduled. Call the rectory office for further information.

**Communion Calls:** Please contact the Rectory when someone who is homebound or in the hospital wishes a visit to receive Holy Communion or the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The Anointing of the Sick is for anyone seriously sick and not only for those near death.

**Ministry of Care:** Eucharistic Ministers are available to visit, pray with, and bring Holy Communion to those who are sick and unable to attend Mass. Notify the Parish Office when this service is needed.

**Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults** is a program for anyone inquiring and seeking information about entering the Catholic faith.

**Weddings:** Weddings need to be scheduled at least six months in advance. Couples are reminded to secure the Church date before the reception hall.
