Lunar New Year and Lent

This Sunday Feb. 11th, we celebrate the Lunar New Year as a faith community and the celebration will continue for many families in the next couple of weeks. On Wednesday, Feb. 14th, Lent begins as we mark ourselves with the ashes on our foreheads. It seems on the surface that the New Year is calling for joyful celebrations whereas Lent is calling us for penitential actions. One has to wonder how we can celebrate these seemingly two opposite celebrations around the same time.

This is an obvious question to ask. In fact, many outsiders asked me this question before. However, I believe that the commonality of these two celebrations is the spirit that they are calling people to generate. The New Year is calling people to be grateful and to be open to God's grace. When we send New Year greetings to people, we are reminded that we are blessed; each one of us is a blessing; and we are called to be a blessing for others. When we wish people abundant prosperities in the New Year, our faith reminds us that we are not only about material prosperity and more importantly we as Christians are about seeking for spiritual prosperity. A wise person once said something like this: justice is good, but justice needs a heart. Similarly, prosperity is good, but prosperity needs a heart. Our faith celebration of the New Year adds the heart to the prosperity that we wish each other to quest in the New Year. So the spirit of the New Year is about blessings and spiritual prosperity.

Lent calls us for conversation and renewal. Through fasting, almsgiving, and prayer, Christians are challenged to renew our relationships with God, others, and oneself. It helps us to know our blessings to be a blessing for others. This call is especially significant in this Year of Prayer. When we pray, we hope to receive God's blessings and God to enable us to be blessings for others. Prayer helps us to seek for spiritual prosperity.

Clearly both the celebrations of the Lunar New Year and of the Lent call us to change and to renew ourselves. This call is for individuals as well as for our communities. Let's take the opportunities seriously as we gather with our families and communities for these special occasions. Let's strive to be a blessing for others and to seek for spiritual prosperity in our lives.

Lenten Regulations (from Feb. 14th, 2024, Ash Wednesday--- the Paschal Triduum)

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. The special Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.



Weddings: Weddings need to be scheduled at least six months in advance. Couples are reminded to secure the Church date before the reception hall.



THE CURSE OF LEPROSY by Fr. John Cuff

Martin was a young soldier in the Roman army. Elegantly dressed, he was mounted on his horse one day when he was accosted by a leper begging for alms. The sight and the stench of rotting flesh was so repulsive to the sensitivities of young Martin that his first instinct was to ride off on his horse. But something inside him made his walk up to the beggar. Since all he had was his military coat, he cut it in two and gave half to the leper while he wrapped himself with the other half. It was a very cold winter day. That night in his dream he saw Christ clothed in a half coat saying to the angels around his throne, "Martin has clothed me with his garment." This event was the turning point in the life of him who was to become St Martin of Tours.

The natural revulsion of Martin before leprosy is nothing compared with the ancient Hebrew attitude to leprosy. To them leprosy was not only a most dreaded natural disease, it was also seen as divine chastisement. In the first reading (Leviticus 13) the dreadful practice of ostracizing lepers is reported as God's will. But today's Gospel of Jesus' stretching out his hand and physically touching the leper presents a different picture. Was leprosy indeed divine chastisement? Was the dehumanizing treatment meted out to lepers as described in Leviticus really God's will? If indeed it were God's will, then there's no way Jesus, God's Anointed, would want to heal a leper. If, on the other hand, leprosy is an unfortunate disease like any other, then there's every possibility that Jesus, who had earlier healed many sick people, would also heal a leper. In any event, the leper in today's Gospel decides to find out once and for all. Ignoring the law that forbids him to approach people, he comes close and kneels before Jesus. Instead of shouting, "Unclean! Unclean!" he says to him, "If it is your will you can make me clean." Jesus says, "It is my will. Be made clean!" So what's going on here? Jesus is challenging the traditional view of holiness and unholiness, that certain people are impure by reason of their health, social status, or birth. His gesture of touching the leper did two things. First, it restored the leper to health. Secondly, it proved to him and to all that leprosy was not a divine chastisement after all but a disease like any other disease that prevents people from being fully alive as God wants all people to be.

Pope John Paul II has declared February 11, the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, as the World Day of the Sick. Leprosy, thank God, has become a curable disease. Yet the tendency to see some diseases as divine punishment and to ostracize those who suffer from them is still with us. How many of us still see people with HIV-AIDS as cursed? Do we not hear tele-evangelists who teach that AIDS is divine punishment for sin? Jesus challenges us today to abandon such dehumanizing beliefs and reach out in solidarity with these modern-day lepers among us, as he himself did in his own day.


