He has taught Theology & Anthropology at the Theological Union in Chicago since 1984. From 1999 to 2008, he held the Bishop Ford Chair of Mission Theology. He is currently Professor of Theology and Culture. Fr. Gittins is the author of 18 books on theological and anthropological topics, as well as on mission and spirituality.

Fr. Gittins's ministry focuses on the intersection of social sciences and theological disciplines. He works with and among marginalized communities and has done missionary and anthropological work in many countries, including in Africa.

What is a Scrutiny Rite?

This Sunday we celebrate the 1st Scrutiny rite with our RCIA candidates at the 9:30am mass at St. Barbara. I was asked, "What is a scrutiny?" Below is a write-up by one of the liturgy experts Paul Turner, which I found helpful.

Scrutinies are rites of self-searching and repentance. When people from another spiritual background seek Baptism in the Catholic Church, they do so by stages. First, we accept them into the Order of Catechumens. Then as they complete their catechetical formation, we enroll them among the "elect," or those chosen for Baptism. This Rite of Election generally coincides with the beginning of Lent. Three times during Lent, the Church prays the scrutinies to encourage a spirit of repentance among those who seek a worthy celebration of Baptism.

Although scrutinies have returned fairly recently to Catholic parishes, they originated early in Church history. St. Ambrose and St. Augustine celebrated them in the fourth and fifth centuries to mark the spiritual progress of the catechumens. The moral preparation of catechumens included prayers of exorcism to drive out the spirit of evil, which kept them from embracing Christ as their light. In the scrutinies, the Church discerned if those exorcisms had achieved their effect. Catechumens entered the church, stood barefoot on goatskin, and renounced evil influences all night. Those unworthy of Baptism had to wait another year for Easter to roll around again.

Today's scrutinies seem less intense. They still include an exorcism, in which the priest or deacon prays that the spirit of good may replace the spirit of evil. Their purpose is not so much to examine the candidates' mental readiness, but their spiritual readiness. Scrutinies offer the catechumens the support they need to approach the waters of Baptism worthily.

For those who are already baptized, the scrutinies invite us to embrace the same spirit of self-searching and repentance. At Easter, we renew our Baptismal promises as we see the catechumens baptized. Therefore, during Lent we renew our repentance as we see the elect scrutinized. The scrutinies remind us of the seriousness of our Christian life and inspire us to turn from evil and pursue good. They enliven our recommitment to Christ at Easter.

THE BLIND MAN'S DOUBLE CURE by Fr. Cuff

All Christians are called upon to witness to their faith, including even those who are blind. I've heard of one such Christian evangelist who was blind, but who was very good at house to house evangelism. He used to go through his neighborhood preaching the Gospel to everyone he met. He'd usually begin by holding up his Bible and shouting, "I was blind but now I see." In this way he'd attract a group of people around him and begin witnessing to them. Physically the man was blind, but spiritually he was clear-sighted, or so he believed.

Today's Gospel focuses on the similarity and difference between physical and spiritual blindness, as do most Gospel stories where Jesus heals blind people. Early Christians saw physical blindness as a metaphor for the spiritual blindness that prevented people from recognizing and coming to Jesus. The stories of Jesus curing the blind testify, therefore, to His power to heal not just the blindness of the eye but, above all, the blindness of the heart. The clue that John the evangelist intended today's Gospel to be read on these two levels, physical and spiritual, is found at the tail end of the story, when Jesus says:

"I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see, and those who do see may become blind."...

Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him,
"Surely we are not blind, are we?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now that you say,
'We see,' your sin remains."

The warning Jesus gives here is valid not only for the Pharisees but also for men and women of our time. To learn from Jesus we must first admit our ignorance, to be healed we must acknowledge our blindness, and to be forgiven we must confess our sins. As John elsewhere tells us, "He who says he has no sin is a liar." With our friends who will be baptized this Easter, may this Lent help us to see that faith experience comes from a personal encounter with the Lord. That's why the blind man arrived at true faith in Jesus before the learned Pharisees. Let's today admit our spiritual blindness and pray, "Lord that we may see," so that we too will receive the light and spiritual insight to see with the eyes of faith.

EVANGELIZING WHILE GIVING ALMS by Roberta Cheong

I recently went to a coffee shop and there was a homeless man sitting on the ground outside. I gave him what food I had with me—a bag of wheat crackers and a bag of rice crackers that I had in my purse. I wished I had something more substantial and filling to give him. My intention was to order a food item and a hot coffee. As I was waiting in line, I told God, "I'm going to give the food I order to the homeless man outside." God replied to me, "But then you won't have anything to eat tonight for dinner." I replied, "I'll be fine. I just want him to have it."

As I was waiting for my food, the employee called out a larger food order for pickup, but the customer had already left, so he gave that customer's food to me for free in addition to the food that I ordered. It was as if God was telling me, "Don't worry, I got you. I'll give food for you and food for you to give to him." God was looking out for me! While I was grabbing napkins to put in the bag for the man outside, one of the employees went to talk to the homeless man. When he came back in, I asked him, "Did you ask him what he needed?" He said. "I think he needs a **new** life, more than food." For a second, I had a flashback of how I had hit rock bottom in 2013, how I needed a new life, and how God gave me a blessed new life through my kidney disease. I answered instantly, "Oh! Well that's easy. Just go to Jesus!" His eyes lit up, looked at me with a mutual understanding that we Christians have The Great Commission on Earth to tell people about Jesus, and said excitedly to me, "Well you tell him that! Tell him that! And if you can help him get a job, that would be even better."

Mark, the homeless man, told me his entire situation in detail. We talked for about 20 minutes. He was happy that someone took the time to listen to his story and understand him. Sometimes people just want to be heard and understood. I asked him, "Mark, do you believe in God? Do you follow Jesus?" He nodded yes and smiled. I said, "I have a gift for you" and gave him a rosary, a pamphlet on how to pray the rosary, a divine mercy image prayer card, and a blessed miraculous medal. He accepted everything I gave him and thanked me. I wish I had more time to talk to him about his faith. I said, "I'll pray for you, Mark. Have a blessed day!" We smiled joyfully as we waved goodbye to each other. Let's give alms, evangelize, and pray for Mark and all those who are homeless and the unemployed.

St. Patrick's Day / no general dispensation

The Archdiocese of Chicago is not granting a general dispensation for the Memorial of St. Patrick from the obligation to abstain from meat on Fridays in Lent. Instead, Catholics who find themselves at an event where meat is served in celebrating St. Patrick may in good conscience substitute the general rule of abstinence with another form of penance or a significant act of charity that benefits the poor. Regardless, it is important to take seriously the obligation to observe Fridays in Lent as a way of uniting ourselves to Jesus who died on Good Friday. That should not be undervalued as we reflect on his sacrifice on the Cross for the salvation of the world in this holy season. *Peace, Bishop Robert Casey, Vicar General*

Lenten Regulations (from Feb. 22nd, 2023, Ash Wednesday--- the Paschal Triduum)

Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years old and older on Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent. Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. The special Paschal fast, as well as abstinence, are prescribed for Good Friday and encouraged for Holy Saturday.
