

Once drawn, we will email and make the completed square sheet public.



Ways to Give

Most of us make our parish offerings and donations by giving cash or writing a check. However, there are other ways of giving, and some may generate more tax benefits for you.

- 1. Give online (GiveCentral & Paypal)
- 2. Give stock or mutual fund holdings
- 3. Give appreciated real estate held for more than one year
- 4. Sign up for Employers' Matching Gifts
- 5. Establish a Donor-Advised Fund
- 6. Make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) from a traditional IRA account
- 7. Give Life Insurance
- 8. Plan for Gifts and Bequests

To Give is to Receive (Tax Benefits)

Last week we went over the benefits of donating through GiveCentral; this week let's talk about six other types of giving that come with other tax benefits.

- 1. Donate stock or mutual fund holdings you will pay no capital gains tax and the parish will receive the full value of the donation.
- With Long-Term Capital Gains or Investments held for more than 1 year, you can claim a fullvalue deduction in your Itemized Deductions.
- With Short-Term Capital Gains or Investments held for less than 1 year, your deduction is limited to the cost basis of the stock or mutual fund in your Itemized Deductions.
- 2. Donate appreciated real estate held for more than one year.
- For property with no mortgage remaining, pay no capital gains tax and claim the full value in your Itemized deductions.
- For a mortgaged property, the extent of tax benefit will depend on the amount of the mortgage remaining.
- 3. Establish a Donor-Advised Fund:
- Easily and quickly set up a charitable investment account for the sole purpose of supporting charitable organizations.
- Qualify for immediate tax deductions through contributions of cash, stock, or mutual funds.
- Grow the invested funds tax-free.
- Recommend ongoing grants to any IRSqualified charities.
- Name a successor to continue gifting to charitable organizations after you are born to eternal life.

- 4. Make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) from a <u>traditional</u> IRA account:
- Donor must be aged 70.5 years or older.
- Payment from a traditional IRA goes to the parish directly.
- Use these donations to lower your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI).
- These distributions count towards the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) if donor is 72 or older.
- 5. Name the Parish in your Life Insurance policy:
- Donate a new or existing life insurance policy by transferring ownership.
- Donate any dividends and receive tax deductions.
- 6. Plan for Gifts and Bequests: Bequests, gift annuities, charitable trusts, and other planned gifts make a lasting impact after you are born to eternal life.

DO WHATEVER HE TELLS YOU by Sr. Caritas

About a year ago or more, I got a new broom for my apartment. The old one was almost too good to throw out. I decided to cut some of the handle off the broom. I took it to my car and put it in the trunk. Now when it snows, I use that broom to brush the snow off the car. It works faster than the snow brush I have. It can reach across most of the top of my car. All of us probably have things which had one purpose originally and we can re-purpose the item for continued use.

In today's Gospel we have a somewhat similar event. At the wedding feast house near the door sat six stone water jars. They were used to store water for the family. Water had to be carried from the well. Jesus re-purposed them. He changed the water into wine and the jars became containers filled with wine, to the amazement of those celebrating. Mary had expectations of Jesus but probably even she was surprised.

In many ways, we are like those water jars. We have many talents and do many things in our lives. Probably at one time or another you have been surprised to find a task you did not believe you could do. At the encouragement of another you discovered it was something you could do, or it was something you could learn to accomplish.

We are like those water jars. We see a certain purpose for ourselves and we live our lives doing it as best we can. Jesus has another idea. In the second reading today, we have a brief and incomplete listing of some of the gifts the Spirit gives to people. We are like those jars open and waiting to be filled with the gift or gifts needed in our lives. God is ready to pour these gifts into us. The Holy Spirit is with us to activate and increase these gifts in us. We have to do what Mary told the servants. We have to have the openness to "Do whatever He tells you." It is much harder to give a gift to a closed hand or in this case, to a closed off person. Openness is the key. So, in this new year, pray for the gift of an open spirit, an open heart. Follow the directive in your life "Do Whatever He Tells you." Follow the will of God. It is the secret to transformation and holiness. Then you will not only "be jars of water," but water transformed into a life of the best tasting wine."

CONCERN FOR OTHERS by Fr. John Cuff

Today's Gospel speaks of the marriage feast at Cana. Mary, the mother of Jesus was invited, as well as Jesus himself and his disciples. As the wedding feast went on, the wine ran out. Mary went out of her way to intercede with Jesus and Jesus performed what John tells us was his very first miracle. But I have a question. If this was Jesus' very first miracle, how then did Mary know that Jesus could do it? Perhaps because good mothers know their children, their hidden talents and potentialities. There are many young men and women who have gone on to accomplish great things in life because their mothers believed in them and encouraged them.

But here's a more fascinating question: Did Mary know all those thirty years she lived with Jesus that she was living with a wonder-worker, and yet never asked him to multiply her bread, turn the water on the dining table into wine, or double her money to make ends meet? How come she never asked Jesus to use his miraculous power to help her out but she was quick to ask him to use it and help others? Think of it. If you had a child with miraculous power to double money for other kids at school, wouldn't you ask him to double yours at home too? After all, one could argue, charity begins at home. However, for Mary and for Jesus the needs of the other come first.

Take the case of Jesus. He knew he had this power to perform miracles. After forty days fast in the desert he was hungry, and when the devil suggested it to him to turn some stones into bread and eat, he refused. Yet he went out and multiplied bread for crowds of his followers to eat. So what are they telling us, Mary and Jesus, through their actions? They're saying that God's gifts to us are not meant primarily only for our own or our families' benefit but for the service of others. That is what St. Paul also tells us in today's second reading when he enumerates the many different gifts of the Holy Spirit to different persons and adds that "to each person is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good," not for personal profit. Today, then, is a good day to ask ourselves: "What gifts has God given me? Am I using these gifts mainly for my own personal profit or for the service of others in the community?"

We sometimes wonder why there are no more manifestations of the Holy Spirit like what we read in the Bible. Maybe the reason is that we have grown more selfish. If we began using the little gifts we have for the common good – such as the gift of praying, singing, teaching, caring, sharing, encouraging, supporting, motivating, writing, etc. -- then these gifts will probably begin to grow and soon we will begin to see miracles. Concern for others is the beginning of miracles, like that of the miracle at Cana.
