A Reflection by Parishioner Roberta Cheong: Planting Seeds, Part II



In Part I, I shared how I have tried to evangelize my roommate at my nursing home. In this part, I will share with you efforts I have taken to evangelize everyone else at the nursing home.

Every 8 hours, I get a different nurse and CNA (certified nursing assistant) so I continuously see different staff members throughout the day and every week I meet someone new. They are typically only in my room for 1-2 minutes at a time, so I have learned to converse with them about God in little pieces. I thought, if I only have 60 seconds, what is the best way for me to love them with the love of Jesus in that time? I decided to first learn everyone's name.

Usually when a nurse or CNA goes into a patient's room, the first thing the patient says is what they need help with. Most patients don't take the time to learn anyone's name. They simply call everyone "Honey." Instead, I consider it a priority that the first thing I do is greet them by their name. I was inspired by Luke 6:12-16 and Matthew 4:18-22. It is when Jesus called the 12 apostles to follow Him; He called each of them by their names. I've learned in the Bible that names are particularly important to God and to people. Just think of the way God named John the Baptist and Jesus (which means "God saves") who is also named Emmanuel (which means "God is with us") and how God renamed Abram to Abraham, Sarai to Sarah, Simon to Peter, Saul to Paul, etc. when they had a new purpose in life. God assigns names intentionally and meaningfully. In fact, it is so important that God made it the 2nd Commandment not to take His holy name in vain.

When I called people by their names, it showed them that I respected and cared about them as a person. So I always ask new staff members what their name is, and then I would use it immediately in a sentence. This helped me remember their name and lets them know that I heard them correctly. Then I would use their name again when thanking them and every time I saw them again in the future. I've noticed that every time I call them by their name, they instantly smiled and had a positive reaction. Many of the staff members and I have now become friends, and we talk about more personal things with each other like family life, work, and religion.

On Sundays, I would cheerfully announce to my nurse, my CNA, the front desk receptionist, and everyone else I see in the hallways, "I'm going to church now! Is there anything or anyone you would like me to pray for?" or "Would you like me to pray for you?" 100% of the time, they say "Yes! Please pray for me!" Some would tell me their specific prayer intentions. By now, the staff knows I go to Mass on Sundays and when they see me, they automatically say "Pray for me!" without me asking. If I saw them again when I came home from church, I would let them know, "I prayed for you today!" Often times, my CNAs would ask me, "How was church today? What did you learn today?" They ask me because they couldn't go. Those are the best opportunities to quickly paraphrase the Gospel reading and the homily from Mass to them, because they are already eager to hear it.

When I see patients who look especially sick, like patients in a wheelchair with extreme edema on their legs, I spend extra time talking to them about how they're doing and tell them that I pray for them to get better. I ask them, "How are you feeling today?" I realize that I have built a reputation for myself here as a Catholic. This has made evangelization easier for me, because I've found that it opens up the invitation for non-Catholics to discuss God with me and other Catholics feel closer to me after they discovered we shared the same faith.

When staff members come into my room, they can see a rosary, palm leaves, prayer cards, and pictures of Jesus and various saints on my wall, and they know right away that I'm Catholic. There's a wooden crucifix and bottle of holy water from Lourdes shaped like the Virgin Mary in my room, and that lets them know as well. If I saw that someone was wearing a crucifix necklace, I would ask them if they were Catholic. That always initiated a conversation about God and religion with them. During Lent, I posted a picture of Jesus on the cross along with a Lenten prayer on my door, so that everyone who passed by my room would be reminded of what Jesus did for them and God's mercy on us.

Easter and Christmas are excellent times of the year to start conversations with people about God, because I can simply ask them "Do you celebrate Easter/Christmas?" and go from there. One time I asked this to my waitress at a restaurant, and she responded with a joyful "Yes, I DO celebrate Christmas!" That was the beginning of our conversation. When I left, I gave her a prayer card with the divine mercy image on it, and she (and her coworkers) was absolutely captivated by the image. I always keep a bag of rosaries, miraculous medals, "how to pray the rosary" pamphlets, divine mercy image prayer cards, and other sacramentals in my purse for unexpected opportunities to evangelize like this one. Giving out sacramentals is a good way to evangelize if there is no time to have a faith conversation. I tell them I have a gift for them (because no one refuses a gift!). The entire dialysis staff and a few CNAs have already been gifted with pocket-sized prayer cards of the divine mercy image, and they loved it!

Let's try to plant the seeds of God (the Good News of God's salvation for all through Jesus Christ) everywhere we are and pray that it bears abundant fruit for the Kingdom of God!

BEING FIRST OR LAST by Sister Caritas

One of the things I observe in classes with young children is, if you say get in line, everyone rushes to be first. This dynamic has taught me that I have to call children in line in a special process, one row at a time or so many boys or girls at a time. This prevents any shoving or pushing and prevents anyone from getting hurt. It takes a while for the children to learn to follow directions. This keeps them from getting hurt.

Jesus is watching people, in today's Gospel, seeking the first places at a banquet, at someone's table or a place of honor. He reminds the apostles that being in the first place, seat, at a table, may end up being an embarrassment if another person is supposed to be there in that seat. Jesus tells the disciples that seeking power or special recognition is not the way to the Kingdom of God. "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." He encourages us to serve and care for the poor and less fortunate rather than looking to be with those who are rich and important.

The power Jesus tells the disciples about is being humble and among the least of the people. This will bring us everlasting power and a place in the kingdom of heaven. We are called to walk in the footsteps of Jesus and His teachings. We are called to be among the poor. "For you will repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

HUMILITY vs HUMILIATION by Fr. John Cuff

A group of American tourists were visiting the home of Beethoven in his home village in Germany; as they passed through the composer's study, one young woman unnoticed quietly sat down at Beethoven's piano and began to play the Moonlight Sonata. She played so well that the others gathered around and listened in hushed silence. The performance over, the young woman broke the silence by asking the caretaker, "I presume a great many musicians visit this place every year." "Oh yes," said the old caretaker, "in fact, the great Paderewski visited here last year." "Oh, really?" said the woman, "And did he play Beethoven's piano?" "No," said the caretaker. "Why not?" asked the woman. "He said he wasn't worthy," replied the caretaker. The young woman's face turned very red.

I'm sure we can all imagine the humiliation of this woman; she was humiliated because she wasn't humble. In today's Gospel, Christ sees many people vying to seat themselves in the best seats at the head table. Inevitably, when someone more important arrives, they are asked to give up their seat and take a place at one of the lesser tables; needless to say, it is a great humiliation, a great loss of face, especially in middle eastern culture. So Christ tells his listeners, "When you are invited to a wedding banquet, make your way to the lowest place, so that the master will say, 'Friend, come up higher'.... "For he who exalts himself shall be humbled, and he who humbles himself shall be exalted."

Some people might think Christ here is simply giving advice on correct social etiquette; actually, he's speaking about humility. And He's thinking of another wedding banquet, the heavenly wedding banquet at the end of the world. He's telling the Jews, "Don't be trying to be first in the Kingdom of God, because you may not get in at all; you must be humble." Because, as the first reading says, "It is the humble man who finds favor with the Lord." In other words, if one is not humble, he may not get into the heavenly banquet at all. The Pharisees, however, didn't think that way; they thought they were invited because they obeyed the Law of Moses, and thus they had earned a ticket to the heavenly banquet. They even thought they had the best seats. But Christ told them, and us, "Don't think like that. Salvation is not earned. It's an unmerited gift; entrance into the Kingdom is by invitation only and is only given to those who admit their humility before God." Indeed, humility is the foundation of all the other virtues, because humility is truth; it lets us see that all good comes from God, Everything we have, our virtues, talents, our intelligence all come from God; even our invitation to the heavenly wedding banquet is a gift from God.
