

Parish Advent Challenge by Roberta Cheong

During Advent, we prepare for Jesus' birthday and the second coming of Jesus, but what was the mission He left us to do before He ascended into Heaven? Jesus said, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). Wouldn't we want to be found as the faithful servant doing what our Master called us to do when He returns?

There are Good News pamphlets at the church entrance. One is in English and one is in Chinese. The Advent Challenge is for each person to take one pamphlet and give it out to someone you know who needs to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ, someone who doesn't know Jesus, or someone who has forgotten the Good News.

If all of us gave it to just ONE person whom we think will actually read it, how many more people would that be who would then know that Jesus loves them and died for them?

Christmas is the best time to evangelize! What would be a better birthday present for Jesus than to bring souls to Him?

If on Jesus' birthday, someone came to church for the first time, prayed for the first time, read the Bible, or decided to believe and follow Jesus, that would be the ultimate birthday gift for Jesus! It would make Jesus SO HAPPY!

So together, let us make it the best birthday ever for Jesus this year! Please feel free to take as many Good News pamphlets as you want—to give to others. How many can you give out before Christmas time?

ISAIAH'S VISION OF THE KINGDOM by Fr. John Cuff

This is one of Aesop's best known fables: A Wolf meets a Lamb straying from the flock. The wolf decides not to pounce on the Lamb right away but first to give the Lamb a reason why he, the Wolf, has a right to eat him. So he says to the Lamb:

"Hi, it was you who insulted me last year." "Actually," says the Lamb in a mournful voice, "I was not born then." Then says the Wolf, "Ah, but you feed in my pasture." "No, sir," says the Lamb, "I have not yet tasted grass." "Besides," says the Wolf, "You drink at my well." "No," replies the Lamb, "I never yet drank water, for as yet my mother's milk is both food and drink to me." At that the Wolf seized him and ate him, saying, "Well! I'm certainly not going without supper, even if you refute all of my accusations."

Aesop is not the only one who sees human relationships in terms of wolves and lambs. The philosopher Thomas Hobbes said about the human condition, "Man is wolf to man." An African proverb says, "A fish has to eat other fish in order to grow." Observing the human community and human relationships, one gets the impression that there are two kinds of people, the oppressors and the oppressed. Isaiah is aware of this state of affairs among humans. He speaks of the human community in terms of wolves and lambs, leopards and kids, lions and calves, bears and cows. He sees that the wolf eats the lamb, the leopard the goat kid, the lion the calf, and the bear the cow. But Isaiah's interest is not simply in the way things are and have always been, but in the way things can be. Isaiah is a prophet, and in today's first reading he prophesies his vision of the Day of the Lord, in "the days to come" when God will manifest his glory to all mankind.

"Impossible," you say, "he's dreaming; the wolf can never live in peace with the lamb because it's the nature of the wolf to eat the lamb." But that's exactly the point. Just as it is impossible, naturally speaking, for the wolf to live in peace with the lamb, so it is impossible for us to live a harmonious life in new world order envisioned by Isaiah and the prophets. A radical transformation of human nature is needed, a completely new heart made possible only by God's grace. Grace transforms nature. Grace working in nature accomplishes much more than we could ever imagine. In our personal and business life, don't we consciously or unconsciously operate on the principle that for us to win someone else has to lose? The vision of the new world order to which the prophets invite us today is founded on the principle that we can all be winners. The story of the Wolf and the Lamb told by Aesop and Hobbes is not the full story. Rather, as Isaiah tells us today, the full story will end with "and they lived happily ever after" in the Kingdom of God.


Please contact parish office for any of the following: **Baptisms:** Parents must be registered practicing parishioner and attend a baptismal preparation session before a baptism will be scheduled.

ST. BARBARA, SAINT AND MARTYR: PATRON SAINT FOR MINERS, FIRE-FIGHTERS, and ARTILLERY. (She's venerated by Catholics who face the danger of sudden and violent death)

St. Barbara known in the Eastern Orthodox Church as the Great Martyr Barbara, lived and suffered during the reign of the emperor Maximian (305-311). Because of doubts about the historicity of her legend, she was removed from the General Roman Calendar in the 1969 revision, though not from the Catholic Church's list of saints.

Barbara was the daughter of the rich pagan named Dioscorus and when his wife died, Dioscorus put all his attention on his only daughter. Barba-

ra was extraordinarily beautiful so Dioscorus decided to hide her from the eyes of strangers. Her father built her a tower where only her pagan teachers were allowed to see her. From her tower, Barbara was able to view the wooded hills, rivers and meadows blanketed with flowers, which was breathtaking. She came to a realization that idols could not have made the surrounding world. Her father and teachers offered worship to these idols, but Barbara's desire to know the true God, consumed her soul so she decided to devote all her life to this goal and to spend her life in virginity.

Before Dioscorus set off on a journey, he ordered a bath-house to be erected for Barbara's use near her tower. Originally, two windows were to put in, but Barbara had three windows put in as a symbol of the Holy Trinity. When her father returned, Barbara acknowledged herself as a Christian, which infuriated her father.

The short end of her story, was that her father, being so angry at his daughter for not renouncing her Christian faith, took out his sword and beheaded her. However, as punishment, on his way home, he was struck by lightning and his body was consumed by flames. Barbara was buried by a Christian, Valentinus, and her tomb became the site of miracles.

St. Barbara Symbols:

<u>The Tower</u>: is a reference to the Holy Trinity and this symbol is frequently associated with military engineering emblems.

The Cannon: a modern symbol referenced to her role as patron of artillerymen.

<u>The Peacock Feather</u>: a traditional Christian symbol of immortality due to the belief that peacock flesh does not decay. The peacock feather is frequently associated with St. Barbara in reference to her home city of Heliopolis.

The Crown: an early Christian symbol of immortality and martyrdom, in reference to the crown of thorns worn by Jesus Christ during his crucifixion.

<u>The Chalice</u>: symbol of the Sacrament, which is often associated with St. Barbara because of her final wish for the grace of Sacrament. St. Barbara is the only female saint to be depicted with the communion chalice and wafer.
