Gospel Lk 10:25-37

There was a scholar of the law who stood up to test Jesus and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" He said in reply, **"You shall love the Lord, your God,** with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live."

But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus,

"And who is my neighbor?"

"A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho.



"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15: 13)."

The Archdiocese of Chicago's priests' convocation was a success last week. Almost 400 of us gathered for four days of prayers, reflection, and sharing. The theme for this convocation was hope. We heard renowned speakers sharing their wisdom on:

How to find hope in Christ?

How to affirm hope in darkness?

How to have hope in the Priesthood?

How to share our hope with others?

How timely and appropriate for us to ponder about hope! After three years of dealing with the global pandemic, going through the difficult process of the Renew My Church, and constantly being reminded of the horrible death of the innocent lives caused by gun violence, we know what darkness is and the question is: where do we find hope and how are we people of hope living in a world filled with darkness?

As Christians, we know that our hope is in Christ. How do we experience the hope of Christ? How do we share that hope with others?

The word hope stands for healing, openness, peace and Eucharist. In order for us to have hope, we must seek for and offer healing to the wounded; we must be open to others and the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives; we must practice peace; and we must root our lives in the Eucharist.

I would like to invite us all to ask ourselves: How does the Eucharist offer us hope?

Eucharist, source and summit of our life and the life of the Church, calls us to practice gratitude, forgiveness and peace. All these virtues are essential parts of hope. In and through the Eucharist, we, the people of God, experience healing, openness and peace.

As we gather to celebrate the Eucharist, let us pray for hope and ask the Holy Spirit to empower each of us to be people of hope in a dark world.

LOVE THY NEIGHBOR by Fr. John Cuff

Catherine Booth, co-founder of the Salvation Army, was an electrifying preacher; wherever she went, crowds of people went to hear her message of hope: princes and nobles, beggars and homeless people. One night, after preaching in a certain city, a certain well-off lady invited Mrs. Booth to dinner. The lady's words of welcome as she arrived were: "My dear Mrs. Booth, that meeting was dreadful." "Whatever do you mean, dear?" asked Mrs. Booth. "Oh, when you were speaking, I was looking at those people opposite to me, those people you brought with you from London; their faces were so terrible, many of them. I don't think I shall sleep tonight!" "Why, dear, don't you know them?" Mrs. Booth asked. "Certainly not!" the hostess replied. "Well, that is interesting," Mrs. Booth said, "I did not bring them with me from London; they are your neighbors!"

The Golden Rule, "Love your neighbor as yourself," which we hear in today's Gospel, is not just a Christian thing. Every ancient religion, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism, all have some variation of this noble precept. If the Golden Rule, then, was so wellknown in ancient cultures, why did Jesus spend so much time teaching it as if it were something new? The reason is that He was teaching it with a completely new understanding. To the question the lawyer asks Jesus in today's Gospel, "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus' answer is: Anyone and everyone without exception. The new thing then in Jesus' teaching of neighborly love is his insistence that all of humanity are one big neighborhood. That's the point he makes in the parable of the Good Samaritan. This outsider, who was regarded as Enemy Number One by the Jewish establishment simply because he was a Samaritan, was the one who by his compassion proved himself to be neighbor to the Jewish man in need.

The lady who invited Mrs. Booth to dinner understood her "neighbor" to be limited to those on her social and economic level. Mrs. Booth reminded her that her "neighbor" should include the nobodies of society. Like this lady, we all need to be reminded that the Christian understanding of "neighbor" admits of no borders. Today is the day to identify and tear down all the borders we have erected between those who belong to us and those who don't. Today's Gospel challenges us to dismantle these walls of division. This way we work with Jesus to realize his dream of the world as a neighborhood without borders by making ourselves neighbor to those in need.

Statement of Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago, on the July 4 mass shooting in Highland Park

July 4, 2022

I have been watching the news in horror as at least 6 are dead and many more were wounded after a gunman opened fire as families attended an Independence Day parade in Highland Park. What should have been a peaceful celebration of our nation's founding ended in unspeakable tragedy.

Please join me in praying for the victims and their loved ones, who never imagined a July 4 celebration could become a killing ground. Pray too for the safety of first responders as they pursue the person responsible for this tragedy. They bravely rushed into the danger to treat victims and to protect others from harm.

The parade reportedly had a heavy presence of police and fire vehicles, yet this shooter was able to wound at least two dozen people before he stopped, or was stopped, and fled. Victims ranged in age from 8 to 85. Weapons designed to rapidly destroy human bodies have no place in civil society.

It is barely July, and this year the United States is already experiencing more than one mass shooting a day. Chicago Police reported at least 55 shot and 7 killed since Friday, and the holiday weekend is not yet over. Gun violence is now the leading cause of death for U.S. children. Whatever one makes of the right to bear arms, there is plenty of room for prudential judgment in interpreting the Second Amendment so as to enact serious, broadly popular gun-safety measures. The Senate finally passed a significant, yet modest, gun-safety bill last month. But clearly more must be done.

The right to bear arms does not eclipse the right to life, or the right of all Americans to go about their lives free of the fear that they might be shredded by bullets at any moment. Gun violence is a life issue. We must continue to pray that all our officials, elected and unelected alike, will redouble their commitment to keeping safe the people they have sworn to serve.

Pope Francis wrote to the people of Chicagoland in 2016: "As Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, humanity 'must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love.' I urge all people, especially young men and women, to respond to Dr. King's prophetic words and know that a culture of nonviolence is not an unattainable dream, but a path that has produced decisive results." May the Lord of mercy embrace in love those who have died, bring healing to the wounded, comfort to their loved ones, and courage to all of us, so that we may respond to this tragedy united as God's children to build a path to safety and peace.
