Your pastor, Fr. Li, will soon be participating in the Catholic Leadership 360 Review process. This review process is part of the ordinary structure required by Archdiocesan Policy of every diocesan priest approximately every five years. It is an opportunity for Fr. Li to recognize his talents and to grow to become a better priest and pastoral minister. Selected members of the parish staff and parish leadership, your Dean, and myself will be asked to be reviewers using this instrument.

According to Archdiocesan policies lay leadership and parishioners are to be given the opportunity to recognize Fr. Li gifts and to share their sentiments about his ministry. So, we are providing a parish-wide survey as part of his review process. The survey can be easily accessed by going to the Archdiocese's web page (https://www.archchicago.org/) and clicking on Offices and Ministries on the top panel. This will bring you to an alphabetical listing of offices. Under 'M', select Ministerial Resources for Parishes. You will then be directed to the Ministerial Resources for Parishes webpage. In the middle of the page, you will find "Parish-wide survey review for priests". The survey is available in English, Spanish, and Polish. Please click on the word 'Link' next to your appropriate language to access the survey.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

will be celebrated on the weekend of Oct. 29 & 30 during all masses.

Why is this Sacrament so important?

Christ is our physician and He healed many during His earthly life and makes his disciples to share in his ministry of compassion and healing: "So they went out

and preached that men should repent. And they cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many that were sick and healed them (#1506, *Catechism of the Catholic Church*).

Illness is part of human condition. Our human family has suffered physically, emotionally and spiritually during the global pandemic. We need God's healing power.

Who Receives this Sacrament?


The Anointing of the Sick "is not a Sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time from him to receive this Sacrament has certainly arrived (#1514, CCC).

If a sick person who received this anointing recovers his health, he can in the case of another grave illness receive this Sacrament again. If during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious, the sacrament may be repeated. It is fitting to receive the Anointing of the sick just prior to a serious operation. The same holds for the elderly whose frailty becomes more pronounced (#1515, CCC).

What Can You Help with?

If you are able to, please bring other members who are homebound and may need assistance to Church so that can be anointed.

If you know any parishioners who are in need of Anointing, but can't physically make it to church, please call our parish offices to arrange for a visit by our priests.



Building the New Reality---Evangelization Update

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ!

As you know, our parish has been intentionally working on Evangelization. Now I would like to take this opportunity to inform you what we have done and where we are at this point for our parish's Evangelization. First of all you must know how blessed we are! The Holy Spirit works each day in our lives and in our community. Our parish belongs to God and God guides us and works in and through us.

Our parish is a diverse and multi-language family. God has blessed our parish with three alpha programs--English, Mandarin and Cantonese. I humbly ask you to continue to invite others to join our Alpha. The Good News is through Alpha, we already have a couple of people who joined our RCIA program this year. The Holy Spirit is working. I am grateful to all who have participated and made efforts to make these evangelization efforts fruitful.

We are blessed to have more than a dozen of our brothers and sisters signed up in our parish to attend the Hospitality Workshops offered by the Archdiocese Evangelization Office. By the way, Archdiocese has also been working hard to implement all sets of programs to building the new reality in parishes throughout the Archdiocese of Chicago. The next training is this Sunday the 16th. Thank you to all who said yes to our Hospitality Ministry.

Some of you also signed up to the Companionship Training, but unfortunately the Archdiocesan office has decided to postpone it to the early spring, 2023. I am grateful to you for saying yes to this ministry and I will keep you posted.

There are other opportunities for you to engage in our parish. English rosary takes place every Wednesday online and every Sunday at 5:30am at St. Barbara Church; Mandarin rosary is every Tuesday online; and Cantonese and Mandarin bible studies are on Monday nights and the second Saturday of the Month. We have many new students, priests, nuns and seminarian brothers who are studying in local universities participate in our monthly Mandarin Bible Sharing.

Mondays with the Sisters of the Missionaries of Charity continue. A small group of us join the Sisters praying the rosary on the streets of Chinatown and Bridgeport and offering Adorations for our parish and for your intentions. This is a wonderful and visible witness to our neighbors.

Our next project is community service- cleaning our neighborhoods in Chinatown and Bridgeport, hopefully on a regular basis. We need your participation to make this successful. If you are interested, please let me know.

Indeed, the Holy Spirit is building us up with fruitful and abundant grace and love in this big family! Remember we all are in this, and this is our calling from the Heavenly Father. Come be part of our faith journey and par-

ticipate in our parish life. Together we build up the Kingdom of God.

PERSISTENT PRAYER by Fr. John Cuff

There's a common ditty about persistence which illustrates that there are no hopeless situations; there are only people who have grown hopeless about their situations.

Two frogs fell into a deep cream bowl; / The one was wise, and a cheery soul. The other one took a gloomy view / And bade his friend a sad adieu. Said the other frog with a merry grin, "I can't get out, but I won't give in I'll swim around till my strength is spent, / Then I will die the more content." And as he swam, though ever it seemed, / His struggling began to churn the cream. Until on top of pure butter he stopped, / And out of the bowl he quickly hopped.

Today's Gospel presents us with another example, that of a woman of faith, a widow, urging us not to grow hopeless about any situation in which we find ourselves, no matter how hopeless it may seem. In ancient Jewish society a woman depended on her husband for sustenance and social status. To lose him meant to be poor and defenseless, especially if she had no grownup son. That was as close to a hopeless situation as one could ever get. The greatness of the widow in the parable lies in her refusal to accept her oppressive and abusive situation in the pretext that "That's the way things are." Less courageous, pious women would even have told her to submit to the oppression as being God's will. But she knew better, maintaining her hope in final justice to right the wrongs inflicted on her by her oppressive neighbors, and her dogged determination paid off.

The early Christians found themselves in such an apparently hopeless predicament. Soon after Jesus left them they found themselves persecuted and oppressed by the Jewish religious hierarchy. What encouraged them to endure the persecution was their belief that the Second Coming of the Lord Jesus was soon to take place. They believed it would coincide with the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the Temple. But when in AD 70 Jerusalem fell and the Temple was destroyed yet Jesus was nowhere to be seen, the Christians found themselves in a big crisis of faith. Have they hoped in vain? Will the Lord ever come back to reestablish justice, to vindicate the innocent and put their enemies to shame? Should they continue hoping and resisting the injustice of their oppressors or should they just join them since they can't beat them? In other words, the early Christians found themselves in the situation of this widow who, without her husband, her lord, had to wage a campaign of passive resistance against injustice and oppression without knowing when it might come to an end. The practical implication of the parable is that we "ought always to pray and never lose heart." Let us ask God today to make us strong in our faith, unwavering in our hope, and persistent in our prayer.

Heart-to-Heart With God: Part 2 by Roberta Cheong

I live a life full of suffering, and there will most likely be plenty of suffering for me in the future. But what suffering haven't I already endured that I wasn't able to when Jesus suffered with me? He carried the bulk of my cross and then gave me His own strength so that I could carry my tiny part of the cross, because He knew I had no strength of my own unless He gave me His. What suffering haven't I endured that didn't bear a thousand good fruits for others when I offered it up to God and a thousand more for my own soul when I united it with the sufferings of Christ? All of it was fruitful, and my spirit has only gained from it. If I must suffer in order to be sanctified, then I thank God for the precious gift of suffering. For I love and fully embrace my cross. because that is when my faith is refined in fire and I am nearest to Jesus. That *refined* faith is going to be necessary to win the spiritual battles that will come my way, equip me spiritually to fulfill God's mission for me on Earth, and help me attain Heaven. All physical suffering ends eventually, and when I look at the past 8 years, it all seems like nothing to me when I look at the cross that Jesus carried and died on for me. The least I can do is carry my cross for Him. It turns out my cross is God's blessing in disguise for me.

Soon, I will be turning 40 years old. If I heard God correctly that day, then I can choose to think of the remaining years of my life as "I *only* have 20 years left to live" or

"I still have 20 more years to live." When I think about my family and friends, I think, "I only have 20 more years with them on Earth." This way of thinking motivates me to take action. It makes me want to spend as much time with them as I can and tell them I love them. It makes me want to ask for forgiveness from everyone I've ever hurt in the past and heal friendships. It makes me want to not waste a single minute arguing with anyone and choosing to make peace instead. It makes me let go of all the petty things in life and forgive instantly. It makes me more patient with people, talk less, and listen more. It makes me value all of my friendships and cherish every moment I'm with them to grow closer to them. It makes me want to tell certain people that they made a positive impact in my life and thank them. It makes me give gifts "just because." It makes me want to create more beautiful and happy memories with my family, and have more family gatherings and dinners with my relatives as well as with my church family. It makes want to get to know the parishioners I barely know. It moves me to evangelize my aunts and uncles and hug them every time I see them. It makes me work hard to evangelize as many people as I can before I die. It makes me overcome my fears and just live. It makes me not waste time dwelling in the past, feeling sadness or regret, or doing useless things. It makes me spend time each day laughing at funny things and sharing jokes with my nursing home roommate. It makes me remember to make time to play. It makes me spend less time on my phone and more time with people in person. It makes me want to give without wanting anything in return. It makes me place importance on *people*, and not money, the fleeting pleasures of the world, or the material things I'm going to leave behind.
