The First World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

In Jan. 2021, Pope Francis declared *A World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly*, which takes place each year on the fourth Sunday in July, close to the Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus.



So next Sunday July 25th is the First World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly and July 26th is the Feast day of Saints Joachim and Anne. One might be asking, why did Pope Francis institute this special worldwide day in honor of Grandparents and the Elderly? The answer is simple, as an elderly himself, Francis wrote, **"The whole Church is close to you – to us – and cares about you, loves you and does not want to leave you alone!"**

"To work toward the future, the past is needed," Pope Francis wisely says. We know that grandparents and the elderly play indispensable roles in our Church and society. In **Sharing the Wisdom of the Time**, Pope Francis wrote, "The elderly have wisdom. They are entrusted with a great responsibility: to transmit their life experience, their family history, the history of a community, of a people."

Thinking of this special book, it also reminds me of the wisdom offered to the younger generation in the book by one of our very own parishioners, **Dominic Lai**, who advises young people to cultivate attitudes of respect and dedication in life by quoting a Chinese proverb, which says, "If you are dedicated, respectful and joyful at your work, the whole group wins." He went on to say, "if someone at work (or in life) is unhappy, why not try to cheer them up? Win-win is the fruit of following this Chinese proverb."

Pope Saint John Paul II wrote, "Arriving at an older age is to be considered a privilege: not simply because not everyone has the good fortune to reach this stage in life, but also, and above all, because this period provides real possibilities for better evaluating the past, for knowing and living more deeply the Paschal Mystery, for becoming an example in the Church for the whole People of God."

Our faith definitely calls us to learn from and to honor the elderly in our society. However we also know the hardships and challenges that life presents to so many of our elderly. The pandemic has taken so many of their lives away. It constantly reminds us that the elderly is the vulnerable population. We know that many of our parish elderly have not returned to in person mass. They are still being cautious and in some cases experiencing financial difficulties, isolation and loneliness.

What can we do to show our care and love for them? Below are a few suggestions for you to consider:

- 1. We will offer a special blessing at all the masses next weekend for our Grandparents and the Elderly.***
- 2. Our priests are ready to visit them at homes or any institutions when they call.***
- 3. Pray for them***
- 4. Offer Mass for their intentions***
- 5. Call and visit them regularly***
- 6. Get to know them***
- 7. Accompany/walk/drive them to Church***
- 8. Take care of their particular needs***

We are grateful to our Grandparents and the elderly and we thank God for them. As we honor them particularly next weekend as a parish and as the universal Church, let's take time to express our love and care for them.

Building the New Reality #5: 'Diminished Witness' - Tom Howard

"Save us, Savior of the world, for, by your Cross and Resurrection, you have set us free."

After our adult children got married, each couple chose to stay relatively close to home to raise their families. Three family units all live within a hundred miles of our Chicago home. It's a joy when we all get together for a particular celebration. Four little grandchildren now dominate our family narrative. While the little cousins are bonding, their adult parents enjoy each other's company. Grandma and grandpa (my wife and I) relish these special moments.



Family life is far from perfect, however. I currently struggle to come to terms with my son's recent conversion to Islam. The prospects for a harmonious, interreligious dialogue seem dim. Family and individual conversations concerning faith and religion usually end up ugly. The topic of the Trinity, in particular, always seems to cause consternation, leading to a commotion.

Abraham, the Jewish and Muslim faith patriarch, is a saint in heaven who intercedes on our behalf. Our relationship is very complex. Someday I may share the backstory. Suffice it to say here that my wife and I were surprised on many occasions during these past seven, somewhat tumultuous, years. Abraham, the father of faith, accompanies me, through thick and thin.

My son, already blessed with a beautiful young daughter, plans on naming his firstborn son after Abraham. He also enthusiastically celebrates Qubani, a Muslim feast commemorating the faith witness of the Prophet Abraham. Abraham, you may recall, was willing to sacrifice his son Isaac to God as an offering.

Abraham's diminished witness resonates with my experience, especially in light of my role as my son's father and now a grandfather to his granddaughter.

Abraham's faith journey was far from easy. He waited over 100 years before Isaac was born. Even then, Abraham's spouse, Sarah, had fundamental problems with the teen Ishmael playing with her newborn child Isaac. Family unity was untenable. Abraham, thus, was forced to send his slave Hagar and their son Ishmael far away. The pain and misunderstanding associated with this family separation still remain, even today. Thanks to his fidelity, God blessed Abraham as the patriarch of two great nations.

It is now clear that I will not be taking my Muslim daughter to mass nor celebrating any of the beautiful Catholic faith traditions with her. It is unrealistic for this grandpa to expect the same religious freedom as with his other granddaughters. Grandpa Tom, like Abraham, is called to witness his faith silently. The role of diminished witness is totally new for me.

When it comes to teaching Christianity and the spiritual mysteries to my granddaughter, I do not expect any immediate answers. In the interim, it would be wonderful to have just one good question to live by. Saint Abraham, intercede for my son and me. May we explore and refrain from explaining; dialogue and hold back from defining.

FAMILY SHEPHERDS - Sr. Caritas



One of the basic elements of society is family. In our time, elements of the family structure have been weakened. Family used to be the source of nourishment, on all levels, and a place of protection and safety. It was where children grew up in freedom, learning the rules and gifts of society. Things which influenced families, did not include the internet or TV or drugs, drug dealing, guns, gun selling or walking streets carrying guns. Family members looked out for each other and did everything to care for each other. Home was the place of refreshment and care, no matter how poor they were. At the same time, being human, no family was nor is perfect.

In the readings today there are references and descriptions referring to shepherds and sheep. Jesus says the people following and gathering around Him reminded Him of "sheep without a shepherd." Some families can also be scattered or never gathering, nor looking out for each other. Jesus saw the people, turning to Him. People were drawn to Jesus as He gave a teaching with a direction and purpose. He welcomed people and acted toward them with care, healing those who were sick.

In our time, people are looking for community, a sense of belonging, a sense of family. Young people are searching for care and direction. They recognize these things and respond. People want to belong to a welcoming community. Our Parish community is a welcoming place and should be. We need to be welcoming and caring. We need to reach out and welcome people who come to be part of us. We need to be those who gather people, who nourish people, who encourage and teach them. We need to be Jesus in our times. We need to act like Jesus would in the situations we are in, in our families and parish. We are to be "The Good Shepherds" today.

ACCEPTING CHRIST'S SUGGESTION - Fr. John Cuff

In today's Gospel, Christ suggests that His Apostles "come away with him to a deserted place" for some rest and reflection. As His missionary disciples, are His words meant for us too? Given our hectic lives in this modern digital age, the answer is a resounding "Yes!" Here's why:

The average American is exposed to about 560 commercial messages every day, most of which are calculated to make him dissatisfied with what he has, and to induce him to want the new, the bigger, the better product. To be honest, most commercials cater to gross selfishness. Consider now in contrast, how little time is dedicated to God here in church. Sunday Mass absorbs about fifty minutes once a week—less time than most of us consume online each day and vastly less time than we spend in front of the TV in the evening. Is it any wonder that we don't recall from week to week what we've heard in the scriptures at Sunday Mass? Should we be surprised if even an occasionally good homily has little or no effect in our lives? The Word of God faces unfair competition for our attention.

The communications media have great potential for good. We can and should derive much from them by way of entertainment and information. At the same time we need an antidote to counteract their potential poison. Today's Gospel offers us a suggestion. We see Jesus surrounded by a large crowd of people say to His Apostles, "Come by yourselves to an out-of-the-way place and rest a little." No one had a more important and urgent mission than Jesus, yet He knew that important things cannot be accomplished without peace of mind, that even urgent matters cannot be handled without prayer.

Battered as we are by almost ceaseless noise and distraction, we run the risk of wandering aimlessly through life like sheep without a shepherd. Subtly influenced by commercials, to which we like to think we pay but scarce attention, we may be nurturing selfishness rather than rooting it out. We need to de-stimulate our senses, to lessen the constant flow of images into our weary brains. We must not be afraid of silence, as we force ourselves to turn off the radio, the computer, the television, to put down newspapers and magazines—at least during *some* of the day. We don't have to have the TV *all the time*. We must search for solitude and an opportunity to think and pray. Alone with God, we should ask ourselves where we are going and what we are trying to do, and what yet needs to be done both in our family life and in the life of our parish, in order to become effective Apostles. Isn't this the first step in our parish's BNR ("Building a New Reality") challenge?
