

Building the New Reality #7: 'GO MAKE A DIFFERENCE' - Tom Howard

A few weeks back, I was privileged to be present at all weekend Masses. Attending four back-to-back masses on a beautiful Sunday morning may seem like a strange choice. I am not a deacon, nor am I currently in any radical pursuit of holiness. Furthermore, I did not have any special announcement to share with our faith community that Sunday.



My intention was more sociological. I wanted to gain a better understanding and appreciation for my audience. Full disclosure: Not only do I enjoy writing, but I believe that

God is calling me to use all of my skills and talents to build the new reality here at SMTCP as one of its evangelization leads. Jing (the other lead) and I have a keen interest in knowing the answer to this core question: *How ready are those in the pews to build a new reality?*

Every Sunday mass follows the same format but still has a unique culture. The 6 a.m. mass, for instance, is commonly known as the "Jimmy Bertucci's" mass. The unwavering love that Jimmy shows for Christ every Sunday is remarkable to witness. And yet, I still believed it is necessary to assess the missionary mindset and discipleship discipline at every mass.

Far be it from me to provide an expert opinion on the overall quality of missionary discipleship at each of our masses. When it comes to carrying out the mission of Jesus Christ here on earth, we are all 'works in progress." Each week, I can add to our corporate understanding with language and vocabulary, and stories related to the field of discipleship.

Fr. Don Headley, a well-known Chicago priest, and champion for social justice who recently just passed, often repeated that the EXIT sign is the most critical sign in a Catholic Church. The exit sign evokes missionary discipleship because it calls each of us to bear witness to our love for Christ out in the world in practical ways. Thanks to the heroic witness of martyrs and others in the early church, we belong to a vibrant and active church today.

What message did you hear from Jesus today that you are ready and willing to bear witness to this week?

The EXIT sign, in short, reminds each of us that we have a sacred duty to go out into the world, proclaiming that Jesus is both crucified and risen. I look forward to sharing more witnesses in the coming weeks. Feel free to share your witness story with Father Li or me. I would love to interview you. Who knows, your witness may make a difference.

HUNGER AND THIRST - Sr. Caritas

When I lived in the Sonoran Desert near Tucson, some years ago I learned a lot about how precious water is. I went from a place that has a huge lake, and usually frequent rain and snow though things seem to be changing some. As we traveled from one community to another, it was usual to find yourself thirsty. Living there for two years I discovered that water was the best thing to quench thirst. The second thing I found helpful was lemonade. The least effective was pop of any kind. Because of the growth of Tucson and Phoenix the level of the water table was less so the native people who lived in the desert, needed to truck in water in mid-summer. We also had to limit our use of water. No dripping facets or unnecessary running of water.

Most United States people have adequate access to food and things to quench their thirst. Being the wealthy and resourceful nation we are, we are blest to be seldom very thirsty or extremely hungry. In Today's Gospel, Jesus encourages us not to live only for material food but to seek the bread that gives eternal life. The people, who sought to have their fill of bread as told in last Sunday's Gospel, ask Jesus to give them this eternal bread. Jesus tells them "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never hunger and whoever believes in me will never thirst." In the front side altar are the words "I thirst." For what things do you hunger and thirst? Our hunger and thirst aren't always for material food and drink. Sometimes we hunger and thirst for emotional things or relationships that were and are not any longer. We are called to believe and to desire friendship with God. Jesus, on the cross, said, "I thirst." At the time His thirst may have been for a drink of water. Some spiritual writers say Jesus thirsted for the salvation of souls. As we walk the road of our spiritual lives, we walk in faith. As we grow, we hunger and long for being closer to God. We thirst to be drawn ever more and more into oneness with God. We seek Jesus in the "bread of life," the Eucharist, which we receive in Holy Communion. Prayer brings us into close oneness with Jesus. The Holy Spirit leads us to be more like Jesus and more aware of performing kind actions and speaking loving words. We open ourselves more to thirsting for Jesus' presence, hungering for the Word of God and His commandments. What do you hunger for today? Seek Jesus the bread of life.

"What can we do to accomplish the works of God?" By Tom McGuire

John Chrysostom (347-407) had a deep appreciation for the radical transformation God works through the mysteries of Christ.

He wrote: "What is performed [in the Eucharist] requires faith and the eyes of the soul: we are not merely to notice what is seen, but to go from this to imagine what cannot be seen. Such is the power of the eyes of faith. ...For faith is the capacity to attend to the invisible as if it were visible."

"Our spirit should be quick to reach out toward God, not only when it is engaged in meditation; at other times also, when it is carrying out its duties, caring for the needy, performing works of charity, giving generously in the service of others. Our spirit should long for God and call him to mind, so that these works may be seasoned with the salt of God's love, and so make a palatable offering to the Lord of the universe. Throughout the whole of our lives we may enjoy the benefit that comes from prayer if we devote a great deal of time to [reaching out toward God]."

Do we believe our work, seasoned with the salt of God's love, will 'accomplish the works of God'?

THE FOOD THAT SATISFIES - Fr. John Cuff

A young missionary in Zambia got a rare vacation in South Africa, then a modern first-world nation but infamous for its apartheid and racial segregation. Back in Zambia, his mates gave him a welcome-back dinner, where the young priest excitedly told of the great time he'd had, and how much better life was in South Africa compared with Zambia, where living standards paled next to its wealthier neighbor. He told of the homily he'd preached, calling on the local youth to give up their anti-apartheid struggle. His reason was that Zambia's economy with Black majority rule was a mess, while South Africa's under White minority rule was doing much better, and so his listeners should give up their struggle for Black majority rule, so as not to become poor like Zambia.

His superior, listening next to him, seemed to grow visibly more and more uneasy. Finally, he spoke up: "OK, Father, why don't we do this," he said, "we lock you up in prison, give you everything you want to eat and drink, but we still keep you locked up in prison?" Immediately the young missionary got the point, namely that the hunger of the human spirit goes beyond the hunger for food and drink. He apologized and sat down.

The point is that we may have all the material food we need, but if we lack such spiritual food as freedom, truth and love, our hunger will be unsatisfied and our hearts restless. Human beings have two kinds of hunger and need two kinds of food to attain satisfaction: food for the body and food for the soul. Both are necessary. But spiritual food comes first in the teachings of Christ. In feeding the 5000, Christ did not mean to say that the solution to the deep hunger of the human spirit is to give people more bread. That's what the crowd were clamoring for, why they wanted to make him king. Because of this Jesus hid from them. He didn't want to be identified primarily with feeding stomachs, rather to be seen primarily as one who has come to nourish the human spirit with the Food that satisfies every hunger of the human heart, which does not perish but gives life eternally, the Food that Catholics are able to receive each Sunday.

The challenge for us today is to recognize that the false god of materialism, which promises satisfaction, but which leaves us even more hungry, has seduced out society. The remedy is to follow the example of Jesus and flee the worldly allure and promises of materialism. It is to pray with St. Augustine, "Oh Lord, You have made us for Yourself, and our hearts are restless till they rest in Thee," and to recognize where true satisfaction is to be found.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a program for anyone inquiring and seeking information about entering the Catholic faith.


Weddings: Weddings need to be scheduled at least six months in advance. Couples are reminded to secure the Church date before the reception hall.
