



Building the New Reality #6: 'Year of St. Joseph' - Tom Howard

Last week a "missionary discipleship" question was posed for our parish to consider as we strive to build a new reality here in our community.

• Can diminishment and suffering lead to a more authentic faith testimony?

Life circumstances forced me to ponder this very question for the past seven years. My choice to be vulnerable, sharing intimate, painful, and heart wrenching details from my personal life, was not an easy one. Courage led me to rely on hope and then taught me to place all my trust in the Lord.

This year Pope Francis invited us to celebrate Saint Joseph. Joseph is a role model for placing trust in the Lord.

You may recall another important Joseph, the dream interpreter, in the daily mass readings a couple of weeks ago. Joseph's jealous older brothers sold him into slavery. And yet, through the grace of God, he eventually became his brother's savior, providing them with desperately needed grain during a time of great famine.

My Catholic faith now blesses me with a plethora of "Joseph" parallels. There are far too many to mention in this short space. I close with just one.



What can Joseph the dreamer and Joseph, Mary's spouse, practically do for us here at SMTCP as we begin building a new reality?

I invite you to return for a moment to our Lenten retreat. Bishop Joseph Perry, the third Joseph in this short narrative, focused his retreat comments on risk-taking. Joseph defied social norms and conventions to raise his family and not abandon Mary. Joseph also drew upon courage to flee Bethlehem and have his family take refuge in Egypt.

As a step-father, Joseph raised Jesus during uncertain times. The physical structure and human governance of tomorrow's Church, too, are pending. The Holy Spirit invites us to embrace the ambiguity and depend upon our faith.

BNR may represent the most significant risk in the history of the Archdiocese Chicago. The radical restructuring of hundreds of parishes provides both great opportunities for growth but little room for lackadaisicalness. Each of us, like Joseph, is called to missionary discipleship.

Jesus, through BNR, has issued a clarion call for everyone in our parish to witness their faith. For some, sharing or writing a faith testimony will come relatively easy, like peeling an orange or riding a bike. For others, like me, it is a grueling and yet profoundly satisfying process. It is gratifying to know that Jesus wants me to be whole.

Look for someone from our evangelization team (Franciso or Sharon) to encourage and/or assist you so you too bear witness to Christ crucified with others. The future of our parish depends upon it. St. Joseph, pray for us.

WHAT YOU HAVE IS ENOUGH - Sr. Caritas

Many years ago, as religious communities began having few people joining, some of us became worried and concerned. "How were we going to continue the number of schools and ministries we were responsible for daily?" One of our wise leaders reminded us of and told us that with God's help, who we were, and the numbers of members and their talents were enough. That is the way it has been.

The First reading today and the Gospel, both talk about feeding the people with what seems to be too little. In the action of acting in faith, Jesus feeds the five thousand and the Prophet feeds the people with twelve grain loaves. In both situations the people had enough and there was food left over, as the Lord had said. The second reading reminds us, "to live in the manner worthy of the call you have received," with a list of virtues which we are to have in our lives. We are called to live faithful to God. Living with faith enables God to bless us in all the ways we need daily blessings and gifts.

Many times, in our daily lives, we may feel as if we do not have enough. We may feel we do not have enough money, enough talents, enough hours in a day or enough knowledge, experience, or smarts to help situations we deal with in our family and our personal lives. The miracle in the Gospel today reminds us that what we do have may not seem like a lot, but trusting in God and living faithful to our call to follow God, will enable us to have enough if we reach out to God, count on His blessings. and live faithful lives following in Jesus' footsteps. Then we will always be enough and have enough to share and nourish those in our lives and those we love.

"...five barley loaves and two fish." By Tom McGuire

"Do you wish to honor the body of Christ? "...He who said: "This is my body" is the same who said: "You saw me hungry and you gave me no food", and "Whatever you did to the least of my brothers you did also to me" ... What good is it if the Eucharistic table is overloaded with golden chalices when your brother is dying of hunger? Start by satisfying his hunger and then with what is left you may adorn the altar as well." Saint John Chrysostom (349-407 AD).

So many hungry people, what good is the little I can do? Jocelyn Soriano responds to this question with a poem:

Five loaves and two fishes
These are all I have
And I didn't think they'd matter much
When there are thousands to be fed.

Five loaves and two fishes
And I was ashamed to ask
If somehow they could help
To feed those hungry men
But You took them in Your hands
And you blessed them
And offered them
To heaven.

And everyone ate 'til everyone's full And everyone believed That you loved them Cause you fed them. And all these out of my small gift The ones I thought didn't matter With five loaves and two fishes You satisfied the hunger of men.

Do I believe that whatever I do to satisfy the hunger of others is honoring the body of Christ?

EXPECTANT FAITH - Fr. John Cuff

Little Johnny got out of Sunday School and his mother came to collect him. "Boy," exclaimed Johnny as he plopped himself into the car, "that story of Moses and all those people crossing the Red Sea was totally awesome" "Tell me all about it," said his mother. "Well, the Israelites got out of Egypt, but Pharaoh and his army chased after them. So the Jews ran as fast as they could until they got to the Red Sea and couldn't go any further! They were trapped! Meanwhile the Egyptian Army got closer and closer. So Moses got out his walkie-talkie and called in the Israeli Air Force to bomb the Egyptians! While that was happening, the Israeli Navy built a pontoon bridge so the people could cross over, and they made it! It was awesome!"

Mom was shocked and asked, "Is that the way your teacher taught you the story?" "Well, no, not exactly," admitted Johnny, "but if I told you the way she told it to us, you'd never believe it, Mom." Little as he was, Johnny had imbibed the secular mentality of our age that makes no room for miracles and spiritual realities. Natural faith, which is limited only to what we can observe and verify, hinders the believer from arriving at that supernatural faith without which we cannot experience the miraculous hand of God.

Today's Gospel about Christ feeding the 5000 mentions two disciples: Philip and Andrew, representing two types of faith, Philip the naturalistic faith that doesn't allow for miracles, and Andrew the supernatural faith that makes room for miracles and so makes miracles possible. When Jesus "tests" Philip, asking where to buy food for the crowd, Philip's answer only confirms how good he was in computation: "Two hundred days' wages would not be enough..." But Jesus only asked Philip as a way of stirring up Philip's materialistic thinking in order, later, to disabuse him of it.

It was then that Andrew, whose faith was more expectant than Philip's, spoke up. "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish..." Andrew also knew this was nothing before such a crowd, yet had enough faith to see that it was enough for a start. Perhaps he mentioned the fish and loaves because he recalled that Jesus at Cana did not make wine out of nothing; he made it out of something. Expectant faith, therefore, does not make us fold our hands and do nothing. Rather it spurs us on to make our best contribution, our own loaves and fish, knowing that without it there'd be no miracle. A miracle is not God working for us but with us. Believers, by believing, enable miracles to happen in life, and non-believers by not believing, block their chances of experiencing a miracle. As Jesus often said, "According to your faith will it be done to you."
